

WAR WILL IMPOSE • RESTRICTIONS IN NATIONAL FOREST

Much of Area To Be Closed
This Season—Extra Pre-
cautions Needed On Fire.

The war has created many complicated forestry problems in the mountains of Oregon and Washington. The officials of the U. S. Forest Service are preparing plans to close much of the national forests to use for recreation and to restrict use of other areas during the 1942 fire season. Forest camps and resort areas adjoining highways and heavily used recreation roads will remain open for use with additional restrictions. Most of the high mountain country may be used after registration.

Where carelessness or negligence would quickly result in a disastrous fire, people other than those having regular business will not be permitted to enter. Closures will not be put into effect until the fire danger justifies, and they will be lifted in the fall when conditions are again safe. All those who use the national forests in the summer should contact a local forest official during his regular working hours, so as to become informed as to closures and restrictions and obtain necessary permits for each visit.

Present Conditions

The fire protection job this season bids fair to be a difficult one as reported by the U. S. Forest Service. War industries and the armed forces have called many of the experienced forest men; industry and defense activities have consumed all surplus labor; many new people unfamiliar with forest protection principles have come into the forest for work; the use of industrial or woods crews to fight forest fires will rob our fighting men and our allies of much needed supplies and equipment; the uneasiness and hysteria caused by forest fires will strain already tense nerves and a smoke pall that will interfere with coastal defense activities is something to be avoided.

At no time in the history of the United States has the nation's timber resource played such an important part in national welfare. The Rogue River National Forest and the adjoining timberlands are one of the most important stands remaining in the state of Oregon. The variety of species, as the Douglas fir, white pine, sugar pine, and ponderosa pine, all of which are highly valuable for lumber manufacture, are needed for a thousand uses to keep the production lines of war materials operating.

Cost Not All

The cost of extinguishing forest fires and the economic loss of the timber burned are not the only reasons for keeping fires out of the forests. Smoke created by such fires as the Cathlamet in 1931, and Poorman's creek in 1935, forms a thick blanket extending many miles from this region. Such a condition this summer might greatly aid enemy maneuvers in the locality. As a result of these conditions, positive and definite action is necessary.

The Protection Job

The Rogue River National Forest protects better than a million and a quarter acres of land. An equal amount and more is protected by the State Forest Service and private agencies in the neighborhood of the Rogue River National Forest. Lightning is the cause of many fires but man-caused fires still occur. A dense forest produces tremendous amounts of fuel on each acre and in just a few hours extreme weather conditions will set the stage for great conflagrations in many places. Control is difficult and the losses heavy, but with all of the precautions taken and the high risks involved, man-made fires have caused most of the damage. In addition to timber values, the Ashland and Medford municipal watersheds must be protected. The watersheds of the Medford, Talent, and other irrigation districts which, in addition to furnishing irrigation water, furnish power for our power plants constructed at tremendous costs, also must be protected in the forest areas.

Closures Extended

Closures have been used for many years on the national forests, and the general public knows little about them because the areas so restricted were small and of little recreational value. Closures will be used again this season, but to a much

greater extent than in the past. Closures or restrictions contemplated on the Rogue River National Forest during the summer follow:

Closed to all public entry except by permit will be power plant sites, power dams, conduits and transmission lines, old burns and snag areas where fires are most difficult to control, industrial and timber operating areas, and areas only lightly used by recreationists where a patrolman or watchman is not justified under present conditions. Slash areas also will be included in this class.

Permits will be issued to all those regularly using the forests, such as loggers, settlers, miners, and stockmen, for specific areas and for legitimate business, but not for recreation. Permits will not be issued for fishing, berry picking or camping.

These closures no doubt will include somebody's favorite fishing place or camping spot, but foregoing that pleasure one year should be more than repaid in better fire protection and as a contribution to winning the war by winning the forest fire battle. Highways which run through closures of this type will be open to through travel except for the possibility of checking travelers when conditions are extremely hazardous.

Examples Cited

Examples of contemplated closures of this type are the areas in which the Medford Corporation operates in the Butte Falls region and the Southern Oregon Sugar Pine Company operations in the Union Creek region; all of the forest lying east of Crater lake and that lying west of upper Klamath lake, and the Ashland city watershed.

Closed to public except by registration will be practically all of the remaining of the national forest except that part of the Applegate district not included in the Ashland city watershed and that part above Union creek to Diamond lake, except the Crater Lake highway which will not be closed throughout its length.

All persons young or old who enter or use these areas will be required to register and each person in the party will need a registration certificate. Regular forest users carrying on a business within the area will be issued season-long registration certificates.

After closures are put into effect registrants should apply at ranger stations or other forest offices for certificates to enter these areas during regular hours. Because of the scarcity of man power and because of the increased work load, registration service will not be available during the night. Applicants can write for registration certificates if necessary.

Closures are a tool of management to prevent fires and will be applied only when indicated by the general or local fire danger. Wide publicity will be given when closures are put into effect late in the spring or the latter part of June. Most spring stream fishing should be over before the closures are put into effect.

Many mountain lakes will be available through registration and with campfire permits during the summer. During the summer those who plan on using or visiting the national forests should become informed on closures or restrictions by contacting the local district ranger or forest supervisor.

Employees of the U. S. Forest Service have been studying and developing forest protection methods and fire fighting techniques for over 30 years, and they should be entitled to public confidence in their ability to choose the best available method of protection for each national forest.

Questions regarding the location, boundary, or type of closure should be discussed with the ranger or supervisor.

FLIES TO BRITAIN IN 400 MINUTES

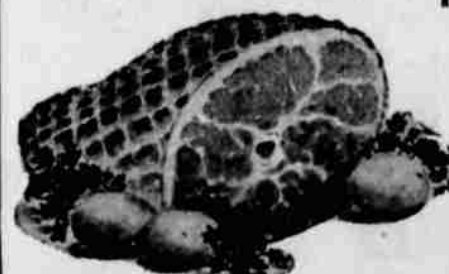
