Garments completed locally recently have included 84 army sweaters, 46 pairs of knitted socks for the navy and 44 navy sweaters for hospital and overseas wear.

Mrs. W. A. Gates, chairman of the war relief department of Jackson county Red Cross, reports that other garments are on hand and will be shipped to headquarters within a short time.

She continued in saying that the letter received from San Francisco added—there are so many places to send the sweaters that headquarters hardly knows where to send them. "Please express appreciation to all who have participated in knitting of garments."

Armchair Cruise to Mexico Related by Wilma Kincaid

Mexicans love life and take time out to enjoy it. That is what Mrs. Wilma Kincaid, instructor at Medford high school, said Wednesday night in describing the Mexican and his interesting country to the south at the second of a series of "armchair cruises" at the Girls Community clubhouse. Mrs. Kincaid has spent two summers in Mexico and found the Mexican to be a friendly and gracious individual, not only to strangers but to his neighbor.

A country one fourth the area of the United States with a population of 19,000,000, 80 per cent of this number are Indian and reside in high plateau regions. Many Mexicans carry guns because they are proud of their highly bedecked holsters; they hold siesta after their luncheon hours, and visit with friends, and stores remain open later in the evening to compensate for lost time. They are romantic through love of music and arts.

Homes of the Mexican are constructed to suit the climate, the mud house being used in the warm belt, the stone house in the cold high plateau region and the thatched hut in the lowlands. Of the 23 states into which Mexico is divided, each has its own national dance, its music, art and language which causes lack of complete unity between the states.

The country has had to fight domination of the church, landowners, dictators and the outside world and Mrs. Kincaid pointed out that at present the country is undergoing a social revolution.

The speaker told of interesting side trips taken to small villages and towns where she found lovely hand woven materials, silversmiths, pottery makers, basket weavers and many hand tooled articles. The Mexican in many parts of the country still relies on himself to carry his burden and many an interesting sight was to see the gay-clad Mexican carrying heavy burdens by baskets suspended by a strap from his forehead. The patient, plodding burro still holds his place in Mexican mode of transportation.

Flowers were abundant and inexpensive. Mrs. Kincaid purchased many orchids for a small sum. Particularly noticeable is the increase of Spanish in the American schools with radios sponsoring Spanish programs. April 14 will be Pan-American day and dedicated to the purpose of bringing about goodwill and inter-American security and understanding, Mrs. Kincaid said.

Many colorful Mexican articles were shown by Mrs. Kincaid among them straw figures, carved mahogany box, gourd pitchers and wall plaques, pottery bright with hand-drawn designs, serapes, silver jewelry, colored glassware and other items.

Mrs. Kincaid reviewing strange customs of the country told of motion pictures, stores, modes of travel and first-hand experiences. Opening her program was the presentation of the national dance, given in costume by Virginia Shanahan and Muriel Platt.
