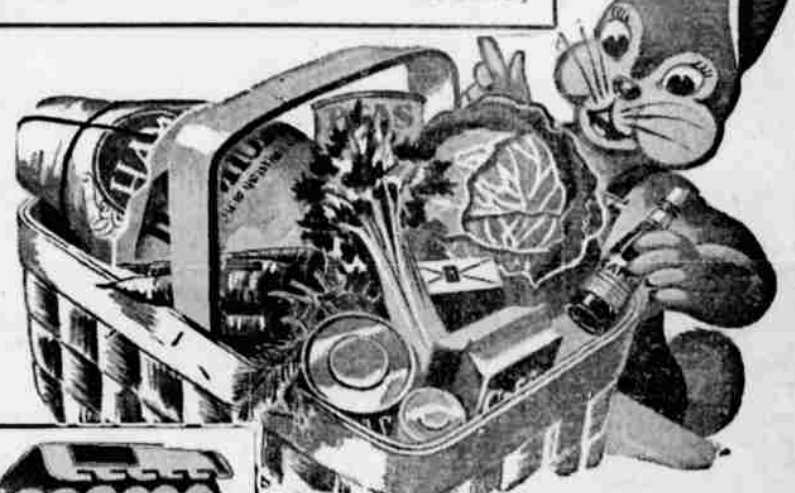
NELSON WILDER, OF NYSSA, DIES
