Places of Formation Listed And Line of March Given For Parade.

Veteran and patriotic societies, defense units, labor unions, civic organizations, several bands, drum and bugle corps and other groups will take part in the "Total War" day parade Monday evening.

The parade will form on North Bartlett street at Sixth and Fourth streets, and at 7:15 o'clock will march south on Bartlett to Main, on Main to Oakdale and on Oakdale to the senior high school field. Those taking part are asked to be present in ample time.

Places of formation for the parade follow:

Veteran and patriotic societies, bands and Red Cross, on Safeway parking lot, Sixth and Bartlett.

Defense companies, horseshoe pitching ground, Sixth and Bartlett.

Labor unions and workers, Fourth street, east and west of Bartlett.

All civilian defense entries not otherwise assigned, old high school lot on Bartlett.

Civic organizations such as Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, 20-30 club, Active club, Fifth street, east of Bartlett.

Boys and Girls Scouts, front of Edgerton garage.

Police, Bartlett street north of horseshoe pitching ground on Bartlett.

Fraternal and social societies, Fifth street, west of Bartlett.

Miscellaneous entries and everything not above assigned, Bartlett, north of Fourth street.

Farm and salvage groups, Apple street, north of Fifth street.

Fire department, forest service, national park service, civilian conservation corps, Apple street, north of Fifth street.

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COMPROMISE SEEN FOR SOLUTION OF INDIA'S PROBLEMS

Gen. Wavell Enters Picture—Major Party Leaders Give Second Thought.

New Delhi, India, April 4.—(AP)—The chances of favorable reception to Britain's freedom proposals were kept alive today by the entry of Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell into the negotiations and by evidence that the two major political elements, the Moslem league and Congress party, were given careful second thought to their decisions.

Weighing heavily with dominant Congress party leaders, informed sources believed, was the realization that it would be catastrophic if Sir Stafford Cripps, the British special envoy, left India without a solution and the country were left to face possible religious war at a time when Japanese invasion is threatened.

Some evidence that the powerful Congress party was giving renewed consideration to the British plan, already rejected conditionally, was seen in the statement of Maulana Abul Kalam Azad party president, that the working committee at a two-hour session had considered the situation in Bengal and Assam in view of the warfare approaching from Burma.

Mohandas K. Gandhi, inspirer of the nationalist movement, who had delayed his departure to give the committee his advice told newspaper correspondents that he still was observing "strict silence," but when asked if he would advise Bengal to follow his policy of non-violence, replied:

"I would advise the whole world to do so—not only Bengal."

Gen. Wavell, commander-in-chief in India, conferred with Cripps, then received Azad and Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, past president of the Congress party. Wavell is expected to see Mohammed Ali Jinnah, president of the Moslem league, next week.

OLD MILK BOTTLE NOW SOUVENIR AT SNIDER'S DAIRY

A milk bottle, more than a third-century old and one of the first shipment of 500 milk bottles to be put into service in the Rogue River valley, was found last week among the regular delivery bottles at Snider Dairy and Produce company. Memories of the early days of the pioneer Medford firm were recalled by this old bottle which bore the inscription: "Pure filtered milk. Medford Dairy, J. W. Snider, Prop."

It was back in 1906 when John Snider introduced the then unique method of delivering milk in bottles. The Medford dairy, later known as Snider's dairy, was then located on the old Warner place west of Medford, and delivery was made by horse and wagon. The bottle, which unexpectedly turned up recently at Snider's, was manufactured by the DeLaval company, a firm which has not manufactured bottles for many years. This remarkable age of the bottle is amazing because of the fact that the 1942-model bottles endure only about seven delivery trips.

Mrs. Maude Snider, now head of the Snider Dairy and Produce company, recalls that the first milk bottles made quite a hit with early citizens of this valley. Mr. Snider had already established a reputation for the quality of his product back in 1906 by employing a system which included seven separate filtering steps. These were the days before pasteurizing was followed and milk sanitation laws were unknown here.

Snider's are keeping the old milk bottle as a souvenir.

ALL LOCOMOTIVES AND CARS FROZEN

Washington, April 4.—(AP)—The government today froze all finished railroad locomotives freight and passenger cars in the hands of producers and took full control over future production and deliveries.

At a meeting with industry representatives next Wednesday, the War Production Board will establish production quotas probably eliminating manufacture of passenger cars entirely.

Production of a limited number of engines and about 18,000 additional wooden freight cars will be permitted under the pending quotas, WPB officials said. Many of the locomotives are due for export.

BICKERINGS NEED CHLOROFORM SAYS HIGH ARMY CHIEF

New York, April 4.—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Hugh A. Drum said tonight "bickerings between groups, the wranglings of peace-time politics, the fostering of disagreements between capital and labor and the vested interests of selfish groups should be chloroformed for the duration of the war."

"The soldier man has accepted his lot cheerfully and expects those behind him to do the same," asserted the commander of the eastern defense command and first army in an Army day speech prepared for broadcast. "These are some of the main contributions he expects of the men and women 'behind the guns.'"

A few hours before General Drum spoke representative army and navy units, West Point cadets, patriotic societies and veterans' groups paraded down Fifth avenue to the cheers and applause of 1,000,000 spectators. An estimated 30,000 persons marched in the Army day observance, police said.

Declaring that the greater unity of the people at home the greater would be the soldier's "aggressive will to fight on the field of battle," General Drum said "that is the spirit of the army and that is the spirit of Army day this year."
