4-H CLUBS WILL DEVOTE WEEK TO VICTORY EFFORT

National 4-H Mobilization Week Opens Today—To Join In Parade Tonight.

4-H clubs of Jackson county will observe National 4-H Mobilization week, April 5 to 11, reports L. E. Francis, county club agent. During the week the 1,500,000 boys and girls of the nation enrolled in the 4-H program will pledge their efforts to the nation's victory program. In Oregon the mobilization week has been proclaimed by Governor Chas. A. Sprague.

Jackson county's activities open this evening when the members enter a float in the Army day parade. Following the parade the club members will present a 4-H victory revue at the Rialto theatre in connection with the popular Jane Withers picture "Young America," which is a portrayal of 4-H club work and its objectives. Twenty club members from 10 communities will participate in the parade and victory revue.

Every 4-H club in the county will be encouraged to take advantage of every opportunity to present its program before the people of its community, and to enroll as many of the available young people as possible in 4-H club work.

William L. Teutsch, assistant director of extension in Oregon made the following statement: "In this national emergency 4-H club members will continue and redouble their efforts through regular projects, but there are numerous special defense activities which will also be furthered. These include collection of scrap aluminum, scrap iron, fire prevention, sale of defense bonds and stamps, and particularly, special training in the meaning of democracy and patriotism. "Boys and girls' 4-H club work for more than a quarter of a century has been making a constructive contribution to the American way of life."

Gov. Sprague's 4-H Mobilization week statement follows: "As Governor of Oregon, I am proud to call to your attention Oregon's participation in National 4-H Club Mobilization Week."

"The 4-H Club program was started and developed in our United States and is the largest volunteer group of youth in the world today, with over 1,600,000 enrolled in the United States, and before the war it was organized in 28 foreign countries."

Oregon has around 26,000 4-H club members enrolled, with over 3000 volunteer local 4-H club leaders advising and assisting in this extensive program of practical work, recreation, and service. This work is conducted by the United States department of agriculture and extension service of Oregon State college with cooperation of the state department of education.

"Every county, yes, nearly every community of Oregon has been touched by this 4-H Club movement. Every state-wide organization in the state has loyally supported the 4-H Club program. Thus the lives of thousands of our young people have been developed for better living and better citizenship."

"Therefore, during this National 4-H Mobilization Week I especially call your attention to the achievements of the 4-H club members of your community, and know all will give to these young people support and encouragement for their part in the 4-H Victory Program."

Hybrid Corn Variety Adapted to Valley Is Offered by Ben Day

Wisconsin 695 variety of hybrid corn has been found to be well adapted to the Rogue River Valley, according to Ben Day, Sams Valley rancher and farmer, who has conducted exhaustive experiments in various sections of southern Oregon. Mr. Day, one of the important growers of seed corn in this section of the coast, has checked many varieties of corn in an effort to find a type suited to the particular requirements of this area.

According to Day, tests conducted by county agents of Jackson and Josephine counties have shown yields as high as 129 bushels to the acre, with 84 per cent grain, silage yields of 15 tons per acre, low moisture content and lodge resistance. These are important factors in the selection of seed corn.

The particular strain of hybrid Day is now breeding for seed has been chosen over many

other varieties following tests extending over the period of four years. Wisconsin 695, now sold by seed stores of this city, has shown consistently high production and rate of maturity under all growing conditions in the Rogue River valley, according to Mr. Day.

JACKSON TO SPEAK AT U-O CONCLAVE

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 6—(Sp.)—Glen Jackson, president of the Jackson county chamber of commerce, has been selected as one of the speakers for the 20th annual meeting of the commonwealth conference to be held on the University of Oregon campus on April 16 and 17. It was announced here Saturday.

FRANCE BUILDING PLANES FOR NAZIS

London, April 6—(P)—The Free French press service asserted today that France was scheduled to produce 6,000 planes in 1942 and that all out 1,000 were for Germany.

The remaining 1,000, it said, were for Vichy's armed forces.

Other military aid being given to the axis by the Vichy government, the statement continued, included the manufacture of torpedoes for the Germans at

Toulon and for the Italians at St. Tropez.

The seaplane works at Toulon the statement said, have produced three prototypes of troop-carrying planes and "are now making plans for their mass production."

Nancy Merkl holds the 440-yard record, and a quartet of winged performers has the relay title, in which they set a new mark of 4:12.4 last year.

From where I sit...

VERY OFTEN these days, I get to thinking about the soldier boys at camp. And the sailors, too.

What worries me is... what happens when they get a day off after working their heads off all week? They go to town... and what then?

What happens? The answer is... mostly nothing! Because most towns near army camps just don't have nearly enough entertainment facilities to take care of the soldiers on leave. So the boys just stand around, leaning against lampposts or sitting on doorsteps. And sometimes, the local townsfolk find themselves wondering what's changed the town... instead of pitching in to help the boys have a good time in decent surroundings.

In many towns, however, the situation is better. Many towns have nice, community places where a soldier can go sit down and "chew the fat" and enjoy some cake and milk, or maybe a good glass of beer. The boys like that. And they're not likely to get in trouble... because common sense tells you

nothing can be wrong about a couple of glasses of beer.

There's another reason, too. The beer industry is cooperating with the army and with the law-enforcement officers to help keep the places where beer is sold, clean and decent. The brewers don't want their beer sold to soldiers in places where bad conditions exist... and they're right.

Seems to me that we Americans ought to get together and do everything we can to make things pleasant for the boys who are in training. They're doing their duty... maybe we have some duties, too, in this direction.

There are lots of ways of helping. We ought to support them all. All of us have our part to play in winning this war... and making life a little easier for the boys in camp is something we all can do something about.
