

MEDFORD GIVING FOR CHINA RELIEF GOES OVER TOP

\$1,000 Goal Exceeded Says Chairman Gates—County Expected to Top \$500.

Medford's contribution to the united China relief drive was "over the top," C. E. "Pop" Gates, city chairman announced today. The quota was set at \$1,000 and residents responded with donations exceeding the quota. It is expected that the county quota of \$1,500 will be exceeded by the time that outlying vicinities have turned in all contributions.

Mr. Gates said that 88 "esteemed grandparent" certificates have been issued during the drive here. These certificates show that the donor has contributed a sum of money which will care for a Chinese youngster for three, six, nine or 12 months. Also three "legion of honor" contributions of \$100 each were secured.

Mrs. Belle F. Littrell of 115 Newtown street, donated a hand made quilt to the united China relief drive in addition to her financial donation, Mr. Gates said today.

Mr. Gates extended thanks from the committee which worked on plans for the campaign to all Jackson county citizens who have contributed to the worthy cause of the Chinese who are fighting a battle for the freedom of democracy in the Far East.

Lieut. Roberts of Navy Arrives from Far East

Lieut. Richard Roberts, U. S. navy, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Roberts of 32 Rose avenue, has been transferred to the naval air station at Pensacola, Fla., as instructor after serving for the past three years as a U. S. naval aviator in Pacific water. Prior to declaration of war with Japan, Lieut. Roberts was stationed in the Philippine Islands. He arrived in this city Sunday noon by United Mainliner.

Before receiving orders for his return to the United States he had participated in all the major battles in the far east up to the fall of Java. He has been flying patrol bombers with the neutrality patrol for the past two years and returned to the United States a few days ago from the southwest Pacific.

In luggage he brought to Medford was a British tin hat which went through the Malay campaign and was given to him by an R. A. F. officer, also various coins from islands in the Pacific. Jackson county residents are familiar with the colored motion pictures, which have been taken by Lieut. Roberts during the past few years, of the Hawaiian and Philippine islands and other points of interest in the Pacific ocean. He said that six reels of new pictures of Philippine life and historic spots, which he was sending his parents, were lost. He plans to leave for his new position in about two weeks. His mother, who was visiting in San Francisco last week with her other son, Dale, accompanied him to Medford Sunday by United Mainliner. His parents did not know of his transfer from the far east war zone until his arrival in the states.

He was acquainted with many of the survivors of the U. S. S. Langley and tanker U. S. S. Peccos, who were interviewed in San Francisco Saturday, their story appearing in today's issue of the Oregon Journal.

Lieut. Roberts graduated from Medford high school, attended University of Oregon, and graduated from Pensacola in 1939.

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Forest Fire Control Desperate Problem Along Pacific Coast

Washington, April 6.—(P)—Forest fire control on the Pacific coast was described in testimony released by the senate appropriations committee today as "the most desperate problem in the whole United States today."

The testimony was given by Senator Downey (D-Calif.) who opposed a \$16,000,000 cut in fire fighting appropriation for the forestry service.

"I think the forestry service made a tremendous mistake in not asking for \$75,000,000 or \$100,000,000 instead of \$18,000,000," Downey said. "The budget allowed \$5,000,000 and the house cut that to \$2,000,000, and I think that they made a very grievous mistake, not knowing the facts."

The committee also made public a statement by Senator Clark (D-Idaho), who said:

"The enemy no doubt has carefully laid plans to cause widespread damage and confusion by setting the forests on fire."

An increase in the appropria-

tion also was urged by Senator McNary (R-Ore.)
