ROOSEVELT GIVES GO-AHEAD SIGNAL TO WARTIME GOLF

President Believes Sensible Participation Would Improve War Effort.

Augusta, Ga., April 7.—(P)—Golf's greats got together here today for the Masters' golf tournament—and got a double helping of cheerful news to start them off.

First was an announcement by Ed Dudley, head of the Professional Golfers association, that President Roosevelt had given golf a wartime go-ahead, along with baseball and other recreational pursuits.

Second, was an announcement by Dudley that the P. G. A.'s 2,300 members have pledged to raise \$250,000 for wartime benefits and relief—five times the amount raised by golf in 1940 or 1941.

Dudley made public a letter from Stephen T. Early, secretary to President Roosevelt, transmitting to him the president's opinion that within reasonable limits he believed the war effort would not be hampered but actually improved by sensible participation in healthful pursuits. The president said his comment applied to general recreation and amusement during the war effort.

Benefits Planned

Fred Corcoran, P. G. A. tournament manager, said the association's golf stars would engage in as many benefit matches as possible for Red Cross and other war activities. To insure adequate amounts for charity, he said, prospective promoters will be required to guarantee at least \$500 to the designated war agency before the P. G. A. will accept co-sponsorship.

Meanwhile, some 50 veteran golf campaigners set their sights for the exacting par-72 Augusta National course in practice rounds prior to the Masters' tourney April 9-12.

NO PERFECT GAME YET IN ABC MEET

Columbus, Ohio, April 7.—(P)—The American Bowling Congress reached the halfway mark today—35 days of maple mauling—after the nation's legions wound up 109,216 games.

The highest game count was a 289 by Walter Selle of Rock Island, Ill., scored in the doubles. There have been three games of 287. One came yesterday when Dave Hammond of St. Paul threw 10 strikes in a row during doubles rolling. The others hitting 287 were Tony Zietler of Kenosha, Wis., and Glenn Shinn of Wooster, Ohio.

The tournament still has to see its first perfect 300 game. In the 41 previous ABC tourneys, nine have been recorded out of 2,393,454 games bowled.

BRAZIL CONQUERS INDIAN ON FOUL

Handsome Pedro Brazil was awarded his headliner wrestling bout with Chief Thunderbird at the armory last night via the foul route when Referee Earl Yockley halted the rough affair at the 18 minute mark.

The decision came after the official had warned Thunderbird several times concerning his unorthodox tactics. And the finale found the referee and two contestants tightly bound between two ropes on one side of the ring. Thunderbird was still trying to extricate himself from the entanglement when Yockley raised Brazil's hand.

The South American champ had a previous fall to his credit when the fracas was ended. After a flurry of cuffs and elbows Brazil sent the Indian crashing to the mat at the 12 minute mark and applied a body press for the fall.

Thunderbird showed his impatience at this stage of the match and twice started to resume the fireworks before the completion of the rest period. After the bell sounded the Chief returned to his unorthodox ways and Brazil was offered, but refused, the match when three minutes had passed.

In the middle event Irish Jim Casey grabbed a fall in the third canto that gave him the victory over clever Tug Carlson. Andre Adoree and Billy Marcus battled to a draw in their four round curtain-raiser.

Casey ended the middle bout when the third stanza was four minutes old. The Irishman tossed Carlson from the ring and the newcomer received a hard crack on the head in the deal. Casey pinned his rival to the mat after several body slams and Carlson was too groggy to continue as the bell clanged for the fourth round of the scheduled six canto event.

But Irish Jim's victory didn't come until Carlson had given a good account of clever wrestling knowledge. The San Franciscan heaved Casey from the ring in the second round.

Neither Marcus nor Adoree could get an advantage in their opener. Marcus, however, managed to clamp a Nelson on Adoree in the initial round. The second stretch was a tumbling match with Marcus trying and failing to connect with a Sonenberg. Adoree tossed his opponent over the ropes in the third and placed Marcus in the throes of an Indian deathlock near the end of the final go. The newcomer squirmed out and gripped the Frenchman with a hammerlock as the bell rang.

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LAWSON TO KEEP 'T' AT STANFORD

Palo Alto, Calif., April 7.—(P)—Jim Lawson, Stanford's new football coach, looked over his candidates at spring practice today and observed: "I think our prospects for next fall are pretty good."

Taking over Clark Shaughnessy's spot as head man in the Indian camp, the former assistant coach noted that he had a goodly assortment of backfield material available and a veteran line from tackle to tackle.

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1,703,099 WORK FOR UNCLE SAM

Washington, April 7.—(P)—Civilian employment in the government's executive branch climbed by another 32,177 persons during January to a record total of 1,703,099, as compared with 1,153,431 in January, 1941.

The increase, the civil service commission reported today, occurred despite the post office department's drop of 53,564 seasonal employees "and therefore shows a definite expansion due to the war program."

Canada to Move 24,000 Japanese

Placing of the Japanese in the sugar beet areas is part of the plan for dispersal of the Pacific coast's entire Japanese population of 24,000 across Canada.
