

NEW YORK COPS CITED IN PROBE OF GAMING RING

49 Officers and Four Lawyers
Said Protecting \$100
Million Annual Syndicate

New York, April 9.—(P)—Two extraordinary grand juries, working under the direction of Special Assistant Attorney General John Harlan Amen in Brooklyn, handed up today six separate presentments naming 49 police officers, including a retired deputy chief inspector, together with four lawyers.

Amen said that the paid police protection of a \$100,000,000-a-year gambling syndicate with a legal department composed of expert attorneys was disclosed by the presentments.

Only First Chapter

Exposure of this alleged organized gambling syndicate, composed of the operators of policy games, dice games, lotteries and bookmaking establishments, was characterized by Amen as only the first chapter of his investigation during the past 11 months of information and complaints that members of the police department were selling "protection" to the policy, bookmaking and general gambling racket in an amount exceeding hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

Two of the presentments were handed up to Supreme Court Justice John MacCraty and the other four to the appellate division of the second department.

"There is in existence today in the police department an organized system of graft and corruption which operates on a city-wide scale," Amen said in a statement. "Its roots are so deep and the lines along which it operates so well-fixed that despite frequent changes of personnel in all ranks its activities continue with little if any let-up."

NAZIS SINK SIX OF NORSE SHIPS

Berlin (from German broadcasts), April 9.—(P)—Six out of 10 Norwegian vessels which attempted to break out of the Swedish port of Goteborg last week were sunk by German naval and air forces and two others fled back to Swedish territorial waters, official German quarters announced today.

(This report indicated that two ships eluded the German blockade. The Vichy radio said Saturday that two vessels had reached Britain and a terse British announcement Sunday said that "certain ships have arrived safely in this country," but did not give the number.)

The Germans' announcement broke their silence on the break by the Norwegian vessels on March 31.
