

FINAL MASTERS' TOURNEY OF WAR TO START TODAY

Augusta, Ga., April 9.—(P)—Over one of the world's loveliest golf courses, the royal family of the game starts playing at 10:30 p. m. (Pacific war time) today in the 72-hole masters' tournament, with the snarl of military motors overhead to remind them that this probably is the last sentimental stop at Bobby Jones' course until after the war.

Even though they have been playing against each other all winter—most of them—from the west coast across the country, the boys seemed not to realize that the big bust-up was at hand until they landed here. Now they do, and it has given them

an added incentive to win the most coveted of the titles, excepting only the open. It was a tense, tightly-wound field of 42 that teed off today.

The masters', though it was what might be called a "manufactured" tournament to begin with, has in the last eight years taken a remarkable hold on the players. One and all, they look forward each year to receiving one of the big embossed invitations, and when none shows up they are crestfallen.

Partly, no doubt, it is because they are playing in the same field with Bobby Jones. It seems almost unbelievable, sometimes, that such mechanically perfect players as the two Texans, Ben Hogan and Byron Nelson, for instance, should stand in such honest awe of Jones. But they do, and to their credit.

Perhaps this gives another angle on the appeal of the masters. The pairings are made with an eye for the dramatic. They do not pull names out of a hat. At 2 o'clock today Jones goes down the first wide fairway with Craig Wood, the de-

Babe, 48, has had a strenuous picture-making, war bond-selling, military camp-entertaining two months here. Previously, he dieted away 40 pounds to get in trim for the picture, about his late New York Yankee teammate, Lou Gehrig.

government. Some of the allied capitals, particularly London, have been letting out matters of strictly American war business, which we considered secret. They will do so no more.

THESE are the only realistic objections heard here, and if any government officials are planning stricter censorship, their plans lack the virtue of necessity.

Certain politically inclined officials, worrying about their own prestige or the coming

elections, have been complaining about criticism in the press. Much has been made of an off-the-record speech by one government publicist asking how long the administration will tolerate what he called "subversive criticism."

There have been rumors that the Mac Leish office of facts and figures would be combined with the Mellett office of government reports, to the elevation of Mr. Mellett and the decline of Mr. Mac Leish.

There have been rumors that an overall government censorship would be established to screw down the lid on news, and even a conversational suggestion that every published news story be submitted to censors before publication.

The rumors are not imaginative speculations of persons outside the government, but they may be the result of inter-office competition in the government, and therefore are not necessarily a forerunner of action.

The fact is, however, that as far as disclosure of military secrets is concerned, more censorship is not justified.

THE Jap radio is just as bad as Rome and Berlin. The Jap broadcasters have sunk the Lexington three or four times by radio but not any other way. They "captured" Port Moresby and Akyab last week, and "reduced" Corregidor half a dozen times.

The records of all the axis stations clearly demonstrate they are not entitled to any consideration. Their job is not to dispense truth, but to go to any lengths necessary to achieve victory over us.

SHREWD judges of sentiment within congress suggest a majority would vote to increase the base-pay week (before overtime) from 40 to 48 hours. However, even some of the strongest critics of labor there are not anxious for action. Certainly

congress is doubtful. But this and related economic issues of prices and wages now seem only to be in a state of preliminary fermentation. The Pepper plan to freeze everything except the capitol dome must be considered in the light of his established position as front runner and try-out advance agent for the administration. Raising the base pay in the army has also helped to quiet some critics of the 40-hour week, and delayed action.

The latest tendency, both in the executive and congressional branch, thus seems inclined to wait until the labor shortage develops in the months ahead, or economic necessity arises for drastic economic steps.
