

WALTER J. LOOKER, SENATE CANDIDATE CITES EXPERIENCE

Walter J. Looker, Jackson county attorney, who has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for state senator, cites widely varied experience and long and intimate knowledge of Jackson county affairs among his qualifications.

Mr. Looker received his early education in Sioux City, Iowa. He worked his way through college by shorthand reporting, in which he had specialized, and his skill in this art has been useful in many instances since.

Among his activities after leaving college, Mr. Looker was chief clerk for the American

Railway Express company; secretary to the president of the Livestock National Bank of Sioux City, for three years; in a civil service position with the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C., for eight years, traveling extensively for that bureau in legal and accounting work.

Enlisting in the navy during World war I, he came west a few years later, operating a dairy ranch and apple orchard in the Yakima valley until 1925, when he came to Medford.

Mr. Looker was admitted to the Oregon bar in 1926 and was associated with A. E. Reames in the practice of law at Medford for eight years, from 1928 to 1936, also acting as court reporter from time to time. He has been secretary-treasurer of the Rogue River Valley Traffic association since 1933 and was attorney for the Farmers and Fruitgrowers Bank of Medford, also serving as cashier of that institution following the death of Delroy Getchell, and until the bank's consolidation with the U. S. National bank.

He is at present engaged in private law practice, in the same office which he established in 1937, also devoting considerable time to various community and business activities.

A member of the Masonic fraternity since he was 21 years old, Mr. Looker is also a member of Medford Post No. 15 of the American Legion, and is president of the Southern Oregon Bar association. In 1940 he was elected secretary-treasurer of the Fruit Growers League of Jackson County.

Concerning his platform, Mr. Looker states:

"If elected, it will be my purpose to continue to devote my time and efforts to the welfare of the people, community and state in which I live. The slogan which I have adopted, 'Service to my community, state and nation,' to me is not a group of idle words.

"We are in a total war, and our first consideration must be winning that war; otherwise we will have no interests left to protect by a wise and judicial government.

"Taxation has always been a paramount issue in the minds of the people. Of all times in our history we have never been faced with tax problems of such magnitude.

"Anything that can be done to lighten the burden of local government without detracting from its efficiency will be a contribution to the total war effort, and if selected by the people I shall try to be always alert to guard against expenditures which cannot be justified on the grounds of need and efficiency."

MOVE JAPS QUICK IS SPRAGUE PLEA

Portland, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Evacuate the Japanese immediately and "let us no longer indulge in false sentimentality about alien enemies," Gov. Charles A. Sprague of Oregon urged last night in a radio address prompted by the fall of Bataan's defenses.

"Get the Japanese away from

the Pacific coast and get them away fast," he said, "else they may do us injury as they did in Pearl Harbor and the Philippines."

He urged they be put to work in the beet fields or at other farm labor.
