

## SGT. ED WALKER OF STATE POLICE TO LAST REWARD

Charles Edgar Walker, 59, sergeant in the game division of the Oregon state police and a resident of Medford most all his life, died in a local hospital Saturday morning of a heart ailment after an illness of three weeks.

Funeral services will be conducted in the Conger chapel at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday, the Rev. R. W. Coleman officiating. Interment will be in Siskiyou Memorial cemetery. Members of the state police will act as pall bearers.

Sgt. Walker was born in Springfield, Ore., March 12, 1883, and spent his entire life in Oregon. At the age of eight he came to Medford with his mother and grew to manhood here.

He entered the law-enforcement service in 1920, prior to the establishment of the state police, and served in that capacity in Roseburg for 10 years. On August 1, 1931, date of the organization of the state police, he was appointed to the game division of that agency and held the position until his death. He was made a sergeant when he was transferred to Medford to cover seven counties, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Coos, Curry and Douglas.

Besides a host of friends he made during his long service here, he leaves to mourn his wife, Hattie M. Walker; two sons, Owen Edgar of Medford and Robert E. of Butte Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Anna Bernal of Oakland, Calif., and Mrs. Mary Harlow of Martinez, Calif.; and two grandchildren, Robert and Sally Walker.

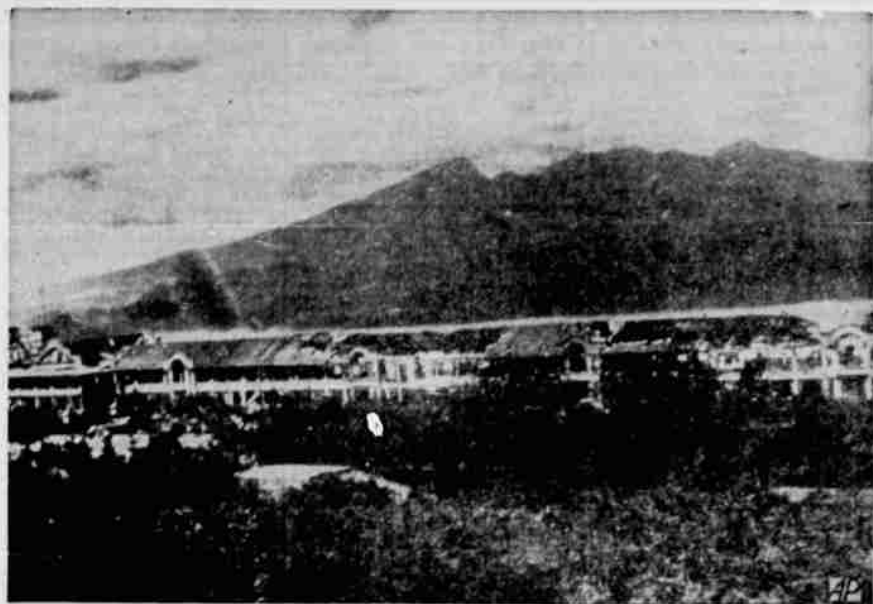

## Armchair Cruise to Dutch East Indies Is Led by Mrs. Fabrick

The beauties of the Dutch East Indies, the palm trees bending symmetrically along the shore line of the Celebes, the pure white sand beaches at Macassar, headhunters, strange foods, customs and friendliness of Bali natives. These were discussed in interesting fashion Wednesday evening by Mrs. Margaret Fabrick at the third of a series of "armchair cruises" at the Girls' Community clubhouse.

The speaker, whose six months' travel included out-of-the-way spots in the western hemisphere, related many of her strange adventures, illustrating her travelogue with pictures of these places, hand-made batiks and other articles of her journey.

After seeing these quiet islands, the peace loving natives and the beauties of their old temples, Mrs. Fabrick said it was hard to realize actual warfare had come to these island paradises.

Although white man has made no attempt to civilize the native population they have tried to take the cruelties out of many of their practices. The missionary, Mrs. Fabrick explained, is not only a teacher of religion but also of sanitation, health, engineering projects and betterment of living conditions.

Shortly after landing near Port Moresby Mrs. Fabrick witnessed a native dance following the execution of a headhunter. Not allowed to remain at this village overnight they continued on to New Guinea where Mrs. Fabrick spent the night sleeping in a native hut over the water. She said she can understand the fright of the natives who are now faced with civilized means of warfare. As a result the natives are said to be fighting not only the foe but their friends and their neighbors.

At Bali a feeling of friendship pervades the whole island, Mrs. Fabrick explained. Everyone is happy and the natives meet the ships, extending to all a welcome not to be forgotten. "A stranger come home" is the way the speaker described her arrival.

In order to have an elaborate funeral corpses are saved until a large number are on hand and then a community funeral is held. Flowers, food and a bamboo temple are arranged for the bodies which are burned and the remains floated out to sea.

Temples are numerous and beautiful, one containing 1,500 Buddhas. From Java Mrs. Fabrick continued to Singapore, where with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Buck, she was taken through the Sultan of Johore's beautiful mansion. A trip into the Saigon country, a description of the shark-infested Johore strait, colorful native costumes, their foods, flowering jungles, the coral reefs and many other items of equal interest were discussed.

Next Wednesday Mrs. S. D. Nason and daughter, Miss Margaret, will speak on "Greenland and the Northwest Passage," illustrating their talk with motion pictures.

Margaret Snyder Parker, wife of Thomas C. Parker, assistant superintendent of Crater Lake National park, passed away at a local hospital early Saturday morning after a brief illness.

Mrs. Parker was born at Park City, Utah, on April 25, 1895, where she spent her early life, and gained her education. She attended the Utah State Agricultural college at Logan, graduated in home economics and later taught school in Salt Lake City and other cities in Utah.

She was united in marriage to Thomas C. Parker at Little Rock, Ark., December 7, 1917. After he returned from army service overseas they moved to Alaska, where Mr. Parker was with the bureau of public roads.

They returned in the fall of 1928 and entered the park service. Mr. Parker being assistant superintendent of Zion National park until he came to Medford in 1938. She was a member of Medford chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution.

She is survived by her husband, Thomas C. Parker, and one son Thomas Cantrell Parker of Medford; also one sister, Miss Pearl Snyder of Salt Lake City, Utah, who is here for the services.

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## LOCAL BOY UPON LOST JAVA SHIP VISITS KIN HERE

"I'm glad to be alive," was comment of Cyril H. Albert, radio man, second class in the navy, when interviewed yesterday afternoon concerning the sinking of his ship, U. S. S. Pecos, in the Java seas early in March.

Albert, a local boy and son of Mrs. Mary E. Albert, 937 South Holly street, was one of approximately 63 men rescued after the navy tanker and supply ship had been sunk by Japanese dive bombers. He said that he clung to a board for six hours before being picked up by an American destroyer. Survivors were taken to an Australian port and brought to the United States by a speedy transport in a voyage taking about three weeks.

Albert is home for a few days self prior to a new assignment. He returned to Medford for the first time in two years.

The Pecos, according to Albert, was attacked by 45 to 50 Japanese planes and sank stem first after a four hour battle. Japanese dive bombers, which are very fast, are underestimated by the people in the United States, he thinks. Added air support for our forces, Albert believes, with turn the tide. He remarked that a reason for Japanese success lay in its merchant marine, one of the world's largest. The ships were built with gun emplacements and were easily armed as transports when the war began.

Albert particularly praised the work of the American flying fortresses and said in regard to allied relations that the Dutchmen were very popular with American sailors.

Relating an amusing anecdote, he told of a cook who had come aboard from a submarine and asked for the commissary steward on the tanker Finding the officer he asked where the commissary not to be alarmed. He only wanted to smell the coffee.

Albert attended Medford high school and has been in the navy three and one half years.
