

Tex Oliver, Oregon Football Coach, to Enter Navy on April 20,

CORLEY, PROBABLE SUCCESSOR; MEET DUE COMING WEEK

Head Mentor Appointed Lieutenant-Commander—May Get Coast Post.

Eugene, Ore., April 11.—(AP)—Gerald A. "Tex" Oliver, head football coach at University of Oregon, said today he had received appointment as a lieutenant commander in the navy and would report at Annapolis April 20.

University athletic officials said they could not meet until next week to name Oliver's successor but it was indicated Line Coach Vaughn Corley would get the head mentor's post.

Oliver will be at Annapolis for one month and it was thought here that he might be named head football coach at the navy physical training center for aviation cadets at St. Mary's college, California.

Coach Oliver, who served in the army during the World War No. 1 and later attended West Point, said from his hospital bed here this evening, "serving the armed forces at the present time is so important that I feel honored to have been selected to serve, although I will leave the University of Oregon and Eugene with regrets. I have enough confidence in the leadership of the armed forces and its personnel that I feel that by October things will be well enough in hand that if there is once football it will be slight." any curtailment in coast conference is confined to a local hospital over the week-end as the result of minor surgery.

PORTLAND DROPS THIRD STRAIGHT GAME TO ANGELS

Red Adams, rookie Angel righthander, pitched seven-hit ball while his mates banged out a total of 15 off Stine and his successor, Sid Cohen.

Big Ted Norbert, Portland outfielder, slammed out his third home run of the young 1942 season.

In the Angels' big second inning Stine gave up five hits, including Waitkus' blow, and a walk, and five runs crossed the plate.

Manager Dutch Lieber will send two righthanded pitchers—Steve Crippen and himself—against the CCC headquarters baseball nine today at 2 o'clock sharp as the Craters open their 1942 practice season at the fairgrounds park. There will be no admission charged and the public is invited to attend.

Slated to hurl part, and perhaps most, of the game for the CCC club is Walter Snyder, a southpaw who has been working out with the Craters and who has taken Lieber's eye. "He's a good lefthander and I want to see what the Craters will do against him," Lieber said in explaining why Snyder, not a member of the CCC, would pitch for that club.

Lieber said the Craters would open with Hal Adam: catching, Crippen pitching, Al Fleishman on first, Don Fawcett on second, Norm Worthley on short, Alex McDonald on third, Dwight Carterwood in left, Harold Fawcett in center and Harold Lang in right. Lieber plans to pitch the last four innings for the Craters.

BEN HOGAN CUTS LEAD OF NELSON IN AUGUSTA PLAY

Augusta, Ga., April 11.—(AP)—That tireless machine of golf—William Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa.—all but broke up the Augusta Masters' tournament today and set its galleries buzzing like a barn-full of aggravated bees.

Tall Byron Nelson still was leading at the three-quarters mark with 207 to Hogan's 210—but better odds held wagers on the Toledo stylist were far more worried about his chances than they were yesterday when he led Sam Byrd, the one-time baseballer, by only a single stroke.

While Nelson shot a methodical 35-37-72 today and Byrd took 36-39-75, the Hershey Prairie Fire sliced five strokes off Nelson's advantage with a flat 34 on the front nine and a paralyzing 33 on the home stretch for 67 best round of the day.

"It was the best managing I ever did," said Hogan coolly after returning to the clubhouse. "I mean manipulating the ball, allowing for wind and roll. You had to do it in that wind."

He was over par only twice—on the par four 440-yard fifth hole when he took three putts, and again on the 425-yard 14th when he overshot the green and missed an eight foot putt for a bogey five.

"It's simply unbelievable," exclaimed former U. S. Open Champion Lawson Little, who played in the twosome immediately following Hogan and early Leader Paul Runyan. "I don't know how you guys do it."

Hogan said he took 15 putts on the first nine and only 13 coming home—a total of 28.
