A reception was given by the Medford Ministerial association Thursday evening at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Louis C. Kirby, for Dr. and Mrs. Sherman L. Divine who are to leave Medford soon, following Dr. Divine's retirement as pastor of the First Presbyterian church.

Dr. and Mrs. Divine were presented a gift and a resolution of tribute from the association was read. They responded with appropriate words of appreciation for the fine fellowship of the occasion and appreciation for the happy and faithful years spent in the service of their church and its community.

The resolution follows: Whereas Dr. Sherman L. Divine, highly esteemed member of the Medford, Oregon, Ministerial Association and pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, is concluding his pastorate and retiring from the active ministry:

Therefore be it resolved that we express to him our deep and sincere regrets, that because he is concluding his pastoral relationship here and moving elsewhere, we shall be denied his genial fellowship and ministerial counsel from among our group.

And be it resolved that we express to him our hearty congratulations for the achievements during his six years of labors as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here, during which time 322 new accessions were made to the church membership; the church debt reduced by approximately \$20,000 and during which time more than \$53,000 were raised for all purposes.

And be it further resolved, that we recognize the esteem by which he is held within the ranks of his own denomination, which repeatedly conferred honors upon him by placing him in high ranking official positions within its general organization.

And be it resolved that we express to Mrs. Divine our esteemed appreciation for her devotedness within our midst, as a woman of culture, gifts and talents. And further, for having distinguished herself as an admirable, charming hostess.

And be it further resolved, that we express to her our sincere appreciation for the loyal, able, and sacrificial manner by which she has contributed to their mutual long ministerial career.

And be it further resolved, that we express to Dr. and Mrs. Divine our admiration for the worthy example their marital bonds have merited over a period of forty-one years, during which time love's ties have been kept as fresh as the dew of each dawning day and as sweet as the blooming flowers of May.

And be it finally resolved, that the consolation and sweet reveries of lives so rich in service, so abundant in the fruitfulness, and so glorious in the outstanding achievements shall be their perpetual reward until the Master grants to them the great and eternal reward for their labors so abundant and successful.
