

QUESTIONNAIRES BEING MAILED TO NEW SELECTEES

Registrants Allowed Ten
Days To Return Paper—
Advisory Board Is Listed.

Selective Service Board No. 2 of Jackson county announced yesterday that occupational questionnaires were being mailed to men in the third registration. The registrant is allowed ten days to complete this questionnaire and return it to the board. The registrant is supposed to answer all questions that pertain to his affairs, however, if he should be unable to understand a question, he may appeal to the following advisory board for assistance.

This board represents only those registrants who come under Jackson County Board No. 2. When a registrant's occupational questionnaire omits needed information, contains material errors or shows that registrant fails to understand the questionnaire, the local board will return the questionnaire to the registrant for correction or completion and direct him to return the questionnaire on or before a specified date.

The experience of the selective service boards in the first two registrations was that the registrants too often tried to secure the service of the advisory board in making out the questionnaire. This is not the intent of the Selective Service law as the questionnaire is a personal record of the registrant and should be filled out entirely by him. The advisory board is merely an assistance committee which will be glad to explain any questions not understood by the registrants.

The Selective Service Board also announces that questionnaires pertaining to selective service will be mailed to all of the registrants of the third registration in the very near future and that these also must be completed by the registrant within ten days and returned to the selective service board. The same registrants' advisory board may be appealed to on this questionnaire. The board requests each registrant to read over every question in both of these questionnaires and if there is any information that he can give pertaining to his affairs which will answer the question it will assist the Selective Service Board in their classifications.

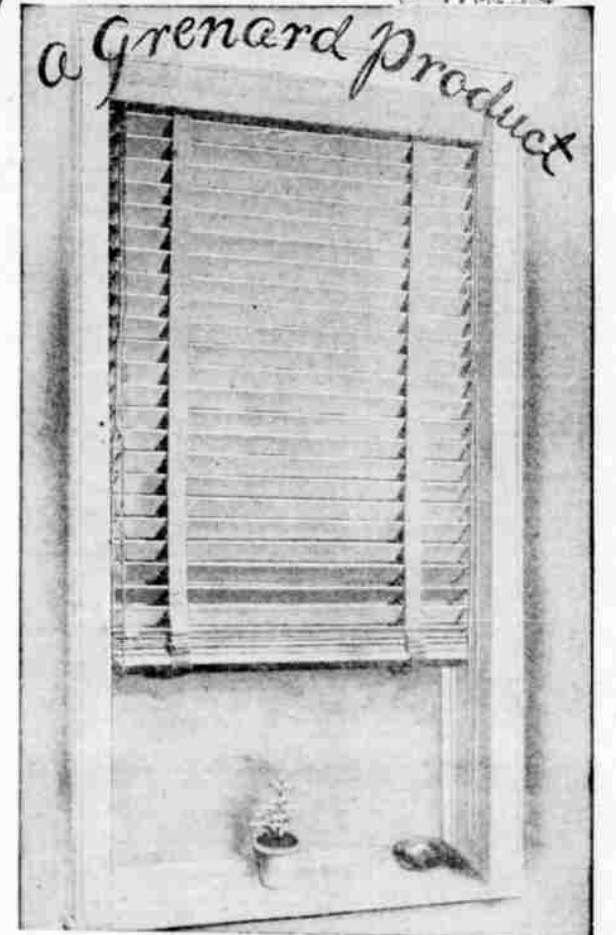
