

HORSEMEN SIGN FOR FORMATION CAVALRY TROOP

A sufficient number of Medford horsemen to constitute a full platoon, signed their intention of enlisting for one year in the proposed cavalry troop of the Oregon State Guard for southern Oregon at a meeting last night at the armory. Several Ashland residents also attended and expressed their confidence that a platoon will be organized at Ashland as soon as the Medford unit has been mustered.

Ages for enlistment in the troop are from 20 to 64 years and it is hoped that older men will also enlist. Minor physical defects are being waived. Size of the local troop will be expanded sufficiently to include any new applicants it was announced today.

A second meeting will be held Sunday at 1 p. m. at the office of O. H. Bengtson, 126 East Main street at which time further enlistments will be accepted. Arrangements also will be made for a reserve enlistment for applicants who wish to be placed on a reserve list.

10 PER CENT SALES TAX PROPOSED BY U. S. C. C.

Washington, April 15.—(P)—The Chamber of Commerce of the United States proposed today that congress impose a retail sales tax at a rate approaching 10 per cent to raise \$5,800,000,000 in new revenue.

CHARLES HOWARD, PIONEER, PASSES

Charles James Howard, 86, Oregon pioneer and resident of southern Oregon for many years, passed away at the home of his son, James E. Howard, in Cottage Grove, Monday, it was learned here today.

Howard's father, James S. Howard, a surveyor, was first mayor of Medford and was known as the father of this city. The deceased, born in Kewanee, Ill., September 17, 1855, and came to Jacksonville with his parents in October, 1860, after a six months' journey across the plains by covered wagon. Howard resided in Medford for several years, then moved to Josephine county and was rural mail carrier at Kerby, where he has many relatives.

Upon retiring he moved to Cottage Grove to be near his sons. He was a Mason and an Oddfellow.

Howard leaves one daughter, Daisy Gilmore of Eureka, Calif.; two sons, James E. Howard of Cottage Grove and Glen Howard of Dallas; one sister, Martha C. Roberts, 40 Crater Lake avenue; 13 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services and burial will be held at Kerby tomorrow at 2 p. m. with the interment in the family plot.
