Artisans Offered Good Pay Ratings In Navy Regiment

According to word received from the navy recruiting office in Portland, several ratings in the naval construction regiment which have been previously closed, are now open. The following ratings are especially needed: blacksmiths, carpenters, coppersmiths, divers, electricians, one road building foreman, stationary firemen, dredge operators, metalsmiths, shop machinists, one shovel operator, stationary engine runners, pipefitters, waterfenders, welders and wharfbuilders. The pay of these ratings ranges from \$60 to \$134 per month including dependence allowance for married men.

Men with minor physical defects such as color-blindness and partial or full dentures will be accepted for this duty. Experienced men in any of the above trades are advised to consult the local navy recruiting office for full details.
