"SMELLEROO" IS UNHAPPY REACTION AL ULBRICKSON'S

Shell Clocked In Slow Time Of 16:20 — Ky Ebright Of Bears Optimistic.

Seattle, April 16.—(P)—"Smelleroo." Never one to make 50 words do the work of one, that's the way Coach Al Ulbrickson summed up the final time trial of his University of Washington varsity crew yesterday.

It was their last three-mile test over the Leschi to Madison Park course before Saturday's race with the University of California for the Pacific coast intercollegiate eight-oared rowing championship.

Today and tomorrow both the Washington Huskies and Berkeley Bears will take final polishing runs, but the heavy work is past.

Also, today, Ulbrickson and Coach Carroll "Ky" Ebright of California will get together for the draw for lanes in the varsity, jayvee and frosh races, the first two or three miles and the latter for two.

The Bears had racked their shells after their second workout of the day late yesterday when the Huskies took to the water.

After reaching the starting line, both varsity and jayvee set forth along the measured course, while the frosh boat poised at the one-mile mark, ready to leap into the fray when the upper class shells reach them.

At the mile mark the varsity was leading the jayvee by half a length. The fresh freshmen then piled in and took a length lead over the varsity which they held the rest of the way. The varsity was four lengths ahead of the high stroking jayvee when the latter craft had to fold at the two and a half mile mark because of the wake from the perturbed Ulbrickson's crew launch.

Afterward Ulbrickson announced the varsity time as 16:20—well over the course record of 15:58.6 which the head shell had bettered by 8.6 seconds only last week. Frosh Coach Walter "Bud" Roney said he clocked his boys in 11:08, or 14 seconds over the 22-year-old mark of 10:54.

"It was a smelleroo," said Ulbrickson in the shell house. "The men had figured all along they had things under control. Lately, the fact California might be better than they expected has sunk home. So they really tried to buckle down and make a good showing. As a result they tightened up and it was agony all the way."

Ebright, meanwhile, was all smiles and appeared a likely candidate for the optimists' club, a new role for the usually gloomy little California mentor.

Major League All Stars May Face Service Nine In July

New York, April 16.—(P)—Members of baseball's advisory council went into another huddle today amid enough gold braid to indicate that a game between a major league all-star team and the best players of the nation's armed forces might be added to the summer diamond menu.

The game would be played July 7 in Cleveland's Municipal stadium, just 24 hours after the annual all-star game between the picked teams of the two major leagues in New York.

Both dates, as well as the sites, were selected yesterday when Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis, President Will H. Hunter of the American League, and President Ford Frick of the National League, the council members, opened their two-day conference.

In addition, the council decided that both games should be played at night in order to get as large crowds as possible. Both will start at 9 p. m. eastern war time.

Although nothing more than the date and place was decided for the second game, representatives of the army and navy were scheduled to sit in on today's discussion, indicating that the often-suggested contest involving a service team might be on the fire.

When such a game was first advanced months ago, major league officials were inclined to discount its possibilities on the theory that players who had swapped their baseball uniforms for army khaki or navy blue would not have a chance to get in shape.
