Salvation Army Part in Present War Told to Zonta

Mrs. Charles K. Cox spoke on the Salvation Army activities in the present war at a luncheon meeting of Zonta at the Jackson Hotel Monday noon. As in the first World War the Salvation Army served the first cup of coffee again at the outbreak of hostilities at Pearl Harbor when the Salvation Army officials put on the coffee pot and boiled the grounds 12 times that one day.

In Honolulu and other cities the Salvation Army is assisting in preparing bandages. In San Francisco the organization is working hard on a heavy program of serving food to boys on guard. They correspond with boys without families in the armed forces and other activities of similar importance.

In Medford, Mrs. Cox said, the chief project is sewing comforters and baby layettes, material for which is furnished by the Contemporary Book club headed by Mrs. William Fluhrer. She also described the camp for underprivileged children.

The speaker was introduced by Miss Louis Sanford. Mrs. Effie Kurtz presented the club with the report to be given at the April 18 conference in Washington where Mrs. Kurtz will represent the local Zonta group. Each member was asked to respond to roll call with a small description of her contribution to "victory".

P.-T. A. Activities

County Council

The increasing need for youth protection in Jackson county will be the subject of a panel discussion sponsored by the county P.T. A. council at 1:00 p. m. Tuesday at Central Point Grange hall. It is generally known that the rapid increase in the county population has brought numerous problems which are being worked out by the organizations most directly connected with them. The problem of youth protection is of vital concern to almost everyone and the P.T. A. and League of Women Voters are cooperating in finding the best possible method of meeting it.

With this in view the P.T. A. has arranged a panel discussion for the purpose of presenting a general picture of the local situation. The participants are in close contact with various phases of youth work and are well qualified to discuss present conditions.

Capt. Charles Cox of the Salvation Army has been requested to tell of his experiences with local youth and the problems that confront them. Theo. J. Norby, Ashland school superintendent, will discuss social behavior, and Leonard Mayfield, Medford high school principal will stress the value of discipline through athletics. Judge J. B. Coleman, with a wide field of experience, will speak on delinquency in Jackson county, and Dr. A. E. Merkel will emphasize the increased need for vigilance in control of venereal diseases. Clyde Fichtner, city policeman, who has for some time been active in the field of youth protection, will stress the need of a full time juvenile officer.

William Ray, 66 Taken By Death

William Ray, 66, a native son of southern Oregon, passed away at a local hospital early Friday after a prolonged illness, due to a paralytic stroke. Mr. Ray was born on the Ray farm near Ruch, Oregon, November 23, 1875. He was a fine Christian man and neighbor and will be mourned by a host of friends. He is survived by two children, Mrs. E. W. Kubli of Applegate, Ore., and Mrs. Eugene Mee, of Medford; also four grandchildren, one brother, Mathew Ray, and one sister, Miss Mollie Ray of Ruch. His brother, Robert Ray passed away March 6, 1942.

His parents, the late William and Mary Louise Ray, were early pioneers of this district, coming west in 1853, and to Ruch in 1857. Funeral services will be held at the funeral home Monday at 10:30 a. m. Rev. E. N. Mallory officiating. Interment will take place in Jacksonville cemetery.

CORRESPONDENT, LATE OF JAPAN, TO SPEAK HERE

Undeclared wars, revolutions, military uprisings, political murders, intimidation by hand grenades, poisonings and sword slashing mixed with earthquakes, tidal waves, typhoons and cholera epidemics have been part of the colorful life of a foreign correspondent, James R. Young, who will tell of his 13 years in Japan when he speaks here April 27 at the high school auditorium under auspices of the Jackson County League of Women Voters.

Known as Jimmy Young throughout the Orient where he operated a news service bureau, managed an American newspaper, sold color comics and worked on a Japanese newspaper, the world heard much of him last year when he was imprisoned by Japanese police for 61 days in solitary.

"Your articles about Japan's army in China are unfavorable. We are very sorry. Please come for short visit," Japanese officials explained when they called for him at his Imperial hotel suite in Tokio.

During a rapid fire series of stories in Japan and China, Jimmy Young seemed to have been on top the powder keg when belligerents touched off the dynamite.
