

G. PASS STRIVES FOR BUS SERVICE TO CANTONMENT

Merchants Ask Council To Help—Subsidized Service Held Well Worth Cost.

Following on the heels of the withdrawal by the Rogue Valley Transit company of its bus service between Grants Pass and Camp White because of lack of patronage, Grants Pass merchants have requested the council to approve the establishment of a bus service to the cantonment, with a 40-cent round-trip fare, in order that Grants Pass can ask for designation as a defense area.

Ted Paulus and Don McGregor, representing the merchants, told the council Wednesday night at Grants Pass business men had been seriously affected by government priorities and that unless the city could be included in the defense area "the shelves in the stores will look like Mother Hubbard's cupboard."

Worth Subsidizing It was explained that even if the bus service didn't pay it would be worth while for merchants of Grants Pass to subsidize it, and that the present plan was to finance the operation by popular subscription and purchase a school bus or similar vehicle to be run on a cooperative basis.

The council took no definite action on the matter but encouraged the move by the merchants and asked to be kept informed of developments.

A government requirement before a town can be designated as a defense housing area is that it must have round-trip bus service to the nearby cantonment at a rate not to exceed 40 cents. The Rogue Valley Transit company's Grants Pass-Camp White service did not meet this requirement.

Ashland, now being served by the Rogue Valley Transit company between there and Camp White, is still seeking a reduction in the round-trip fare from 55 to 40 cents in order that a defense housing area designation may be forthcoming.

Woman Air Warden Whips Smoker Who Wouldn't Douse Fag

Newark, N. J., April 17.—(P)—A recalcitrant cigarette smoker, whose refusal to obey a woman air raid warden's demand he cease smoking during a test blackout brought him a rawhide whipping, was sentenced to a year in jail yesterday for disorderly conduct.

Judge William Untermyer in imposing the sentence on Archie Otom, 47, of Newark, said he hoped the prison term would be a lesson to those who failed to heed instructions in the blackout of metropolitan New Jersey Wednesday night.

The warden, Mrs. Esther Glanella, was given the whip for protection by her husband when she went on duty.

She said the man made an indecent proposal and grabbed her arm after she demanded he stop smoking. When police arrived she was wielding the whip.

Sale of Ammunition To Britain Impeded By Cartel, Is Claim

Washington, April 17.—(P)—A justice department attorney told the senate patents committee today that an international cartel agreement between German interests and the Remington Arms company, controlled by E. I. Du Pont de Nemours and Company had impeded American sales of military ammunition to England and other parts of the British empire.

Allen Doherty, special assistant to the attorney general in the anti-trust division, testified that the agreement permitted sale of ammunition to England for shooting grouse, quail, ducks and for target practice. But Remington may not sell ammunition containing tetracene to Great Britain for the purpose of shooting Germans.

Doherty's charges surprised members of the senate committee and Senators Lucas (D. Ill.) La Follette (Prog. Wis.) and Bone (D. Wash.) asked if the agreement still was operating.

The anti-trust lawyer said counsel for Remington Arms informed him they had broken the agreement not to sell to England and other parts of the British empire in recent days.

SEELY HALL TO JOIN AIR CORPS

Seely V. Hall, operations vice-president for the western division of United Air Lines, spent yesterday here on personal business in preparation for his departure soon for Washington, D. C., where he will enter the army air service with the rank of colonel. Central avenue, and his son, Seely, Jr., who has been attending high school here and making his home with his grandmother, Mr. and Mrs. Seely Hall and another son, Owen, make their home in San Carlos, Calif.
