

CHURCH LEADERS TO ATTEND MEET HERE ON SUNDAY

Ministers, Sunday School Superintendents, Coming For Christian Convention.

The United Christian Advance convention to open at the First Christian church Sunday at 2 p. m. will be attended by a team of three national leaders from Chicago, Philadelphia and New York City. The Rev. R. W. Coleman, who has been named chairman of the convention in this city said that this will be one of the most significant interdenominational conventions ever held in southern Oregon.

One hundred and thirty-five similar conventions are being held in the United States in the three weeks between April 13 and May 2. They are designed to stimulate church leaders and to extend their programs to reach all people in each given community. Ministers, Sunday school superintendents, educational committee members, missionary leaders, official board members, teachers or officers representing work with children and youth and adults are included in the convocation.

Leaders Coming
Attending the Medford conference will be Dr. Walter D. Howell, director of church school administration, Board of Education, Presbyterian church, U.S.A.; Dr. Nathaniel F. Forsyth, associate secretary of the division of the local church, Board of Education, Methodist church and Dr. Mark A. Dawber, executive secretary of the Home Missions Council of North America. They will be supported by some state denominational representatives. The convention in this city is sponsored by the Medford and Rogue River Valley Ministerial associations.

Dr. Dawber, Rev. Coleman said today, has just completed a survey of the social conditions in over 250 national defense areas in the U.S.A. for the home missions council of North America. His message is expected to be helpful to those who are planning for the service men who will come to Medford soon. This is one of three interdenominational meetings being held in Oregon, the others in Portland and Pendleton.

Patriotic Quotient Test Prepared For Civilians

Palo Alto, Calif., April 16.—(AP)—How close are you coming to a personal all-out effort to help the war program? A test designed to enable civilians to rate themselves in this respect was devised by three Stanford university faculty members and made public today. Here it is:

First, take a look at Mr. Hypothetical all-over.

He spends around 5 per cent of his income for war bonds and stamps, always cleans his plate, wastes no food, never drives faster than 40. He is an air raid warden or has some volunteer defense job, writes regularly to a man in the armed forces abroad, admonishes others not to repeat rumors or military information, tries to keep fit with hikes or other exercise. When he hears about work stoppages, he digs into his own job a little harder.

Nowself test questions. Rate yourself from zero to 10 according to your idea of how well you are:

1. Avoiding waste of all kind, in the kitchen, factory, on the highway, everywhere.
2. Buying war bonds and stamps with every penny you can spare.
3. Taking part in civilian defense, Red Cross or other voluntary war work.
4. Serving in silence, guarding vital information and suppressing and refusing to pass on wild rumors.
5. Extending assistance and

hospitality to our armed forces at home cheering our fighters on the war front, applauding our workers for jobs well done.

6. Doing your daily job to the best of your ability and keeping physically fit.

7. Maintaining a cheerful outlook in spite of unfavorable news from the front or such things as strikes and profiteering on the home front.

8. Contributing willingly to worthwhile organizations such as the USO, Red Cross and navy relief.

9. Maintaining a cooperative attitude toward all war-time regulations, especially those measures that tend to disrupt your way of life.

10. Utilizing to the best of your ability other opportunities for war activity.

CALYX SPRAY IS ADVISED NOW BY COUNTY EXPERTS

Calyx spray on apples and pears should be applied when 80 per cent of the petals have fallen, according to C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent, and L. G. Gentner, of the Southern Oregon Experiment station. If two applications are to be made on Bartlett's, start when 50 per cent of the petals have fallen (now) and again eight days later.

For codling moth control on apples, Bartlett's, Bosc and Comice pears, the agents advise use of three pounds of arsenate of lead plus one-sixteenth to one-quarter pound of spreader

per 100 gallons. Other varieties should also be sprayed if worm control has been difficult, the agents said, continuing: "It is also desirable to spray at this time for scab control. If the lead arsenate spray is to be applied, add 6 pounds of wettable sulfur to 100 gallons of the above mixture. If foaming is excessive, omit the spreader. If no lead arsenate is applied, just use 6 pounds of wettable sulfur per 100 gallons."

U.S. COAST GUARD IN NEED OF MEN

The U. S. coast guard has openings in the reserve for fully qualified men as 3rd and 2nd class radiomen, ship's cooks and as 2nd class machinist's mates and motor machinist's mates. Applicants for radiomen rat-

ing must be able to send and receive coded messages at the rate of 20 words per minute.

Those believing they have had sufficient experience to satisfy the requirements, are in good physical condition, between the ages of 17 and 35, and desire to go to sea with the U. S. coast guard as a radioman.
