

Husky Boat Crews Score Three-Ply Victory Over California Bears

VARSITY WINS BY 3 LENGTHS, JAYCEE BOAT BY 7 FEET

Record Time Set By All—
One Contest Close; Freshmen Surprise.

Seattle, April 18.—(P)—For the ninth time in the 39-year old history of the Pacific coast regatta the University of Washington Huskies scored a clean sweep over California's clean rowed crews in a record and nerve shattering three-ply victory today.

The Huskies, defending Pacific coast and national rowing champions, made it three straight in the varsity and jaycee races and snapped California's two-year freshman reign in the opening froth two-miler.

Only the California varsity failed to better existing records for the old Leschi-Madison park course on scenic Lake Washington. In both the froth and jaycee races, both winning and losing crews turned in better than record time, and the Washington varsity did likewise in the afternoon's finale.

Here are the results:
Varsity—(Three miles)—Won by Washington, three lengths, in 15 minutes, 54 seconds. California second in 16:05. (New record, old mark of 15:58 set by Washington in 1922.)

Junior varsity—(Three miles)—Won by Washington, seven feet, 15:55. California second in 15:55.5. (New record, old mark of 16:26.2 set by Washington in 1926.)

Freshmen—(Two miles)—Won by Washington, six lengths, 10:20.5. California second in 10:43.3. (New record, old mark of 10:44.4 set by Washington in 1926.)

Although slightly favored to win, nobody expected Washington to coast in to a three-length victory over the sun-tanned

giants from Berkeley in the varsity race.

The "hoos race" of the day, however, was the Washington jaycee victory. Not given a chance by the predictors, the Husky jaycees finally squeezed through by seven feet in a tussle in which there never was open water between the two 60-foot cedar stogies. And the jaycees rowed the three-mile course in only one second slower time than did the Washington varsity.

As a matter of fact, the Cal jaycees turned in far better time than did their first boat, being 9.5 seconds faster.

The Washington froth won, as expected, over the California yearlings.

GRID ACES GIVE STATE 2 TO 1 WIN

Corvallis, Ore., April 18.—(P)—Don Durdan, triple sport star, and Norm Peters, a football teammate, paired up today to earn Oregon State college a 2-1 victory over Oregon in the opening northern division coast conference baseball game.

With Peters on second base in the ninth inning, Durdan cracked out a single. The throw beat Peters to the plate, but the big outfielder, who played end on the Rose Bowl football team, threw a perfect block or the Oregon catcher, who dropped the ball.

Peters also accounted for State's first run, doubling in the sixth to score Strode.

Oregon tied the count in the ninth on a scratch single by Carney, a sacrifice, and a line single by Farrell.

Beaver Pitcher Glen Elliott limited the heavy hitting Oregon to seven hits and whiffed eight. Nick Begleries of Oregon also allowed but seven blows, striking out five men.

With Rube Melton holding the Dodgers to four hits, the Phils cashed in on home runs by Nick Etten and Rookie Ron Northey to produce the triumph that gave them new life but failed to lift them out of the cellar.

Melton issued nine bases on balls, but fanned seven men. The Dodgers left ten base runners stranded.

Pittsburgh, April 18.—(AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates moved into a tie for the National league lead today as Lefty Ken Heintzelman, making his 1942 debut, blanked the St. Louis Cardinals, 3-0, allowing only five hits.

Heintzelman was in trouble only in the seventh but after allowing successive singles by Ray Sanders and Jimmy Brown he retired the next three men in easy fashion.

New York, April 18.—(P)—The world champion New York Yankees met their match today in rookie Yank Terry, who limited them to three hits in pitching the Boston Red Sox to a 5-1 decision.

In handing the champions their first defeat in five starts this season, the Red Sox elevated themselves into a triple tie for the American league lead along with the Yanks and the St. Louis Browns, who lost to Detroit for their first setback.

Terry, a 29-year-old right-hander who was voted the most valuable player in the Pacific Coast league last year when he won 26 and lost only eight for San Diego, missed a shutout by walking pinch-hitter George Selkirk in the eighth.
