

BEAGLE DISTRICT LANDOWNERS WILL VACATE ON JULY 1

Land owners in the Beagle-Antelope cantonment area have been advised in letters from the real estate project manager's office of the land section of the U. S. army engineers that they probably won't be asked to vacate their farms and ranches until July 1 instead of June 1. It was learned yesterday.

Although the army hasn't and never has, set any specific date by which the land-owners must be off their property to make way for further construction of Camp White, the letters made it clear that July 1 was the estimated vacating date. This extension of time, farmers pointed out, would enable them to harvest their first crops of alfalfa and hay.

It was also learned that most all of the land owners have been advised of the official approval and setting of the cantonment boundary lines, thus clearing up a certain amount of bewilderment in the minds of a number of farmers and ranchers, who hadn't previously known whether they would be requested to vacate their property.

A number of land owners in the Beagle area, dissatisfied with appraisal prices offered them for options on their land, have decided to fight condemnation suits to be filed by the U. S. attorney's office. As yet no condemnation proceedings have been instituted in this area.

SIGHT MORE GAS FOR NORTHWEST

Los Angeles, April 18.—(P)—Increased gasoline and oil shipments to the Pacific northwest may soon cause relaxing of petroleum rationing in Washington and Oregon.

Chairman William F. Humphrey of the fifth petroleum district general committee, said today that cooperation of southland oil producers has resulted in a constantly increasing number of tank cars and trucks for oil shipments to the northwest. "Barring unforeseen developments," he declared at a meeting of the committee, "it would seem that a more liberal allowance for the northwestern dealers may result."

A recent order by the national petroleum coordinator cut deliveries to northwestern service stations an additional 13 1/2 per cent, reducing the supply a total of 33 1-3 per cent.

FORESTERS TALK RUST CAMPAIGN

J. G. Friedly, executive assistant, P. N. Pratt, timber expert, R. S. Kearns, forester, and R. E. Kimmey, district ranger, of Roseburg, were visitors at the O & C administration office here last week. Mr. Friedly made arrangements for various services and supplies with local firms in conjunction with the blister rust program, while Messrs. Kearns, Pratt and Kimmey conferred with the local office and local operators on timber sales, sustained yield units, and grazing matters.

They were accompanied north by Miss June Bleich, local secretary at the O & C office who is being transferred to the Portland office. She will be replaced by Miss Bonita Hammack, who has been employed by the Jackson County Welfare office. They will also be accompanied by District Ranger Krueger who will attend a range development conference at Portland, April 20 to 22.

JOSEPH F. SINGER TO LAST REWARD

Portland, Ore., April 18.—(P)—Joseph F. Singer, veteran doorkeeper of the U. S. senate reserved gallery and sergeant-at-arms of the Oregon legislature, died at a hospital here today.

Singer, who became gallery doorkeeper in 1909, had been ill for some time with a throat ailment. When the senate and the state legislature were in session at the same time Singer customarily obtained leave to return to Oregon.

WAR BOND BUYING HOLDS UP WELL IN JACKSON COUNTY

Citizens of Oregon, in spite of the fact that heavy income tax payments were "just around the corner," purchased a total of \$4,383,483 worth of series "E" war savings bonds during February, it was announced by Ray Conway, state administrator. Figure for February, which does not include purchases of "F" or "G" bonds, are the latest available.

Sales for February, which is also a short business month, bring the total for the state since the promotional campaign was launched last July to \$22,280,644. January broke all records with a total of \$8,713,632, but this figure was swelled by many purchasers who bought their limit of \$5,000 face value for the year, it is pointed out. December, the "war" month, totalled \$3,712,921.

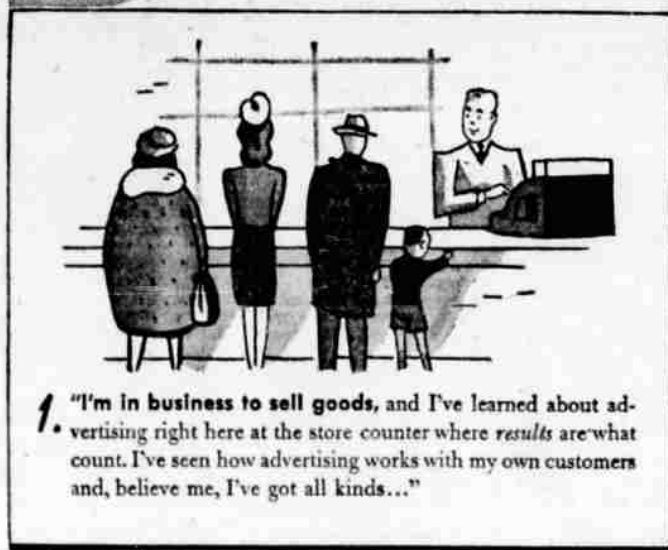

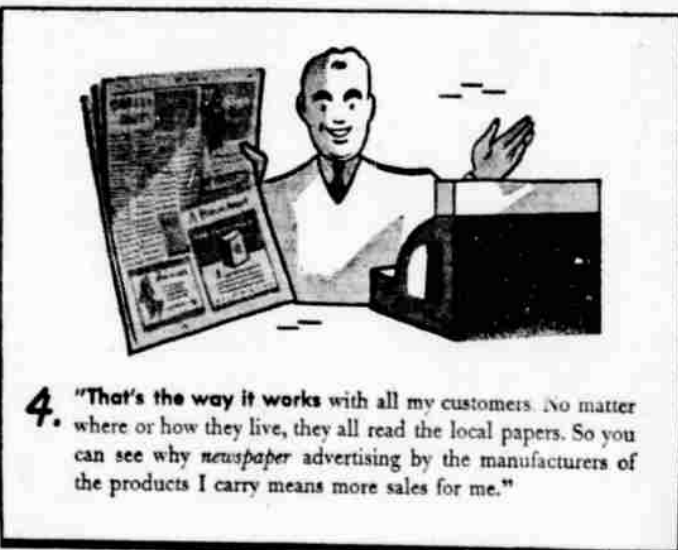
