Study Club Hears Book Review

Thursday Morning Study club members heard a review of the book "Central America" and a sketch of the life of the author, Charles Morrow Wilson, at a recent club meeting at the Girls' Community clubhouse.

Mrs. Kenneth Wells reviewed the life of the author, who was born in Arkansas of fourth generation farmers, worked on a newspaper after college days and wrote his first novel in 1930.

CHALKER'S MOTEL GRANTED LICENSE BY LIQUOR BOARD

The state liquor commission at its meeting last Friday in Portland granted a restaurant license to Chalker's Motel on the Pacific highway near Gold Hill, owned by the Rogue River Investment company. The company is composed of Maurice Spatz, George Fields and Bruce Bauer. Sheriff Syd I. Brown said.

Due to confusion with a planned Four-Corners resort, the liquor commission rejected the first application, the sheriff said. It was too close to the cantonment.

Chalker's Motel is 17 miles from the cantonment, and about the same distance from this city. It was originally the Foothills Community House, and later

was operated by Ernest Ernst. A man by the name of Chalker from California later purchased it, and then sold it to the Rogue River Investment company. Attorney W. M. McAllister represented the investment company at the hearing.

The application for a service bar for the Lithia Hotel, Ashland, was deferred until the May meeting. Petitions, signed by Ashland residents, for and against granting of the license were presented. The license is sought by A. L. Snyder, who declared he was ready to invest \$3,000 in a cocktail lounge.
