

Popular Sockeye MacDonald On Tonight's Mat Bill

PEDRO BRAZIL IS SLATED TO FACE TACOMA LOGGERS

Casey and Kruse Tangle in Semi-Windup — Carlson, Marcus in Opener.

Appearing on a local mat card for the first time in a year and half, popular Sockeye Jack McDonald of Tacoma will grapple with handsome Pedro Brazil, South American champ, in the one-hour main event of Promoter Mack Lillard's three-match program at the Medford armory this evening.

Fans expect a slugfest as both men, favorites with Medfordites, are adept at that kind of play although not having the reputation of meanies. Sockeye is not the type to dilly-dally with the less spectacular scientific wrestling and is a rough and tough bull-dozing battler who, nevertheless, manages to work without fouls.

Pedro Can Take It
Pedro is willing to stay scientific as long as his opponent follows suit. But he is also capable of unleashing rough stuff and has a remarkable faculty of being able to stand up under punishment. He has displayed this ability by winning five of his six bouts in the Medford arena and thereby establishing himself as probably the best opposition Lillard could find to face the ex-timberman.

The crushing Irishman, Jim Casey, whose grappling Medford fans have well approved, tangles with the Oswego ring veteran, Bob Kruse, in the six-canto semi-windup event. Blonde, wavy haired Tug Carlson mixes with bronzed Billy Marcus in the four-round curtain-raiser. The opener will get under way at 8:30.

Oakland's string of consecutive victories was broken Sunday, but the Oaks won one game of their doubleheader with Portland and that, combined with Hollywood's double victory over Seattle, was enough to boost them into first place in the coast league standings.

There were several marked changes in positions over the week-end. Seattle, long in first place, dropped to second, while San Francisco advanced from seventh to fourth. San Diego climbed to sixth place and Portland replaced that club in the cellar.

Oakland won the first game from Portland yesterday, 3 to 0, stretching its series of consecutive victories to seven. Portland turned the tables in the seven-inning nightcap, however, for a 4 to 2 victory.

Eight thousand home town fans turned out to watch Hollywood do battle with Seattle. The Stars rewarded them well, slapping the visitors down twice, 3 to 1 and 7 to 3.

San Francisco and Sacramento split Sunday's doubleheader, the Seals winning the first, 9 to 4, and Sacramento taking the seven-inning final, 6 to 5.

At San Diego, Los Angeles shut out the home town team, 7 to 0, in the first game, but a home run with one man on base in the sixth inning gave San Diego a 5 to 4 nightcap victory.
