Stringed Trio Presents Varied Program At Methodist Church

The Morgan Trio, a concert organization composed of three musically gifted sisters playing the violin, harp and piano, was presented last night in the auditorium of the First Methodist church before an audience that taxed capacity of the room.

The program featured music from early and also the modern French school and from the Spanish and Russian thought of today.

The opening number was a prelude and four stately dances from the work of Couperin (1668-1773), arranged in concerto form for harp, piano and violin. Each instrument was given a share in delivering of the graceful and exquisite text of this early French musician and composer. The ensemble of violin, piano and harp is one seldom heard, is unique but very beautiful as chamber music.

The violin concerto, Vivaldi, 1660-1748, also an early French musician who with Couperin contributed to the musical background of the immortal John Sebastian Bach, was chosen as the solo violin number and was the highlight of the program. The arrangements for harp of Debussy's numbers played with exquisite skill and musicianship evoked the beauties of the noble instrument. The pianist, Marguerite, no less an artist as an accompanist than as a soloist, won the hearts of her hearers by her delicate and adequate interpretation as well as her mastery of the technique.

The encores were Blue Danube Waltzes, Strauss' Hungarian dance No. 7, Brahms', both arranged by the trio.

The artists, continuing their concert tour of the northwest, left this morning for Portland and Seattle to fill engagements. Among out-of-town guests were Miss Lucie Landon, director of instrumental music, S. O. C. E., and Mrs. Esther Palmer Day, harpist of Grants Pass.

A reception, honoring the artists at home of Dr. and Mrs. Chas. W. Lemery, Windsor avenue was held following the concert. Mrs. Hegan, president, Mrs. A. O. Bauman, former president poured, and Mrs. Darrell Huron and Mrs. Royal Bebb assisted about the room.

Friends Enjoy Birthday Party

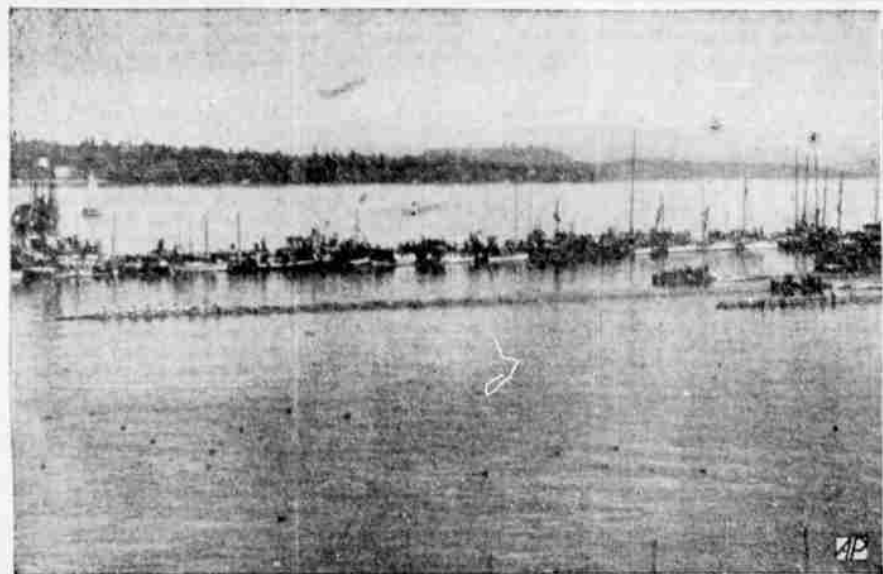

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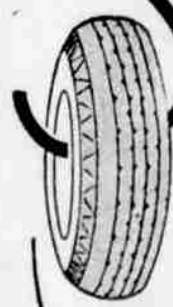
