

BEER LICENSES MAIN BUSINESS BEFORE COUNCIL

Application For "The Pit,"
East Main Denied—Bray-
ton, Barnes Plea Denied.

The application of Jack E. Lingren for a retail beer class B license for "The Pit," 114 East Main street, was denied by the city council at its semi-monthly meeting last night, on the recommendation of the license committee, and the application of E. H. Brayton and J. C. Barnes for the same type of license at 29-31 South Front street was referred to the license committee for study, with full power to act.

The council adopted an ordinance authorizing the execution of a renewal contract with the National Hospital association for city employees, who pay \$2 a month for this medical service. J. C. Collins cast a dissenting vote.

Amend Oil Lease
Approved was an amendment

to the lease to the Shell Oil company providing for the payment by the oil concern to the city of one cent a gallon on all gasoline sold at the municipal airport area, instead of just that sold by the company on its leased premises.

The recommendation of the land appraisals committee that the Gagnon residence at 11th street and South Oakdale avenue be sold for \$1,800 cash, to a client represented by Fred B. Lennard, was approved.

Other business transacted included the adoption of the finance committee's report and the empowering of Mayor H. S. Deuel to appoint the budget committee at his own discretion, the personnel to be announced at the next regular meeting of the council.

Girls' Club Activity Explained to Rotary By Mrs. Mary Phipps

Activities of the Medford Girls' Community club were outlined at the Tuesday luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club by Mrs. Mary Phipps, president of the organization. Rotarians, assembled at the Hotel Medford, heard Mrs. Phipps outline the four-point program of the club, comprising room rental to girls of low income, free employment service for women, an activity program for girls and provision for a central recreation and entertainment headquarters for local women's club and girls.

The home making program of the Community club was described by Mrs. Phipps as an important contribution to girls' welfare in this area. During the

past nine years, in which this organization has functioned, more than 150 girls have lived at the club house on North Bartlett street and many have been married there. Assistance given to the young women seeking both housing and jobs was stressed in the report.

Among important contributions of the Girls' Community club to the life of the community have been the establishment of the first employment service for women and pioneering the junior symphony orchestra movement so popular here a few years ago.

The Girls' Community club is one of the beneficiaries of the Community Chest here.

J. P. Naumes, Rotary club program chairman, introduced the speaker.

BUBONIC RODENTS NOTHING NEW HERE

The discovery by the U. S. Biological Survey that Jackson and Josephine county squirrels have bubonic carrying fleas, is nothing to lay awake nights about, or particularly new, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler. For years, there have been squirrels similarly afflicted in Siskiyou and Modoc counties, California, and in Lake, Klamath and Deschutes counties in this state.

About six weeks ago, Fowler

recommended the Ruch district as a place to find them, and a biological survey crew found 17 rodents there with bubonic fleas. It seems the Ruch area is a favorite rendezvous for squirrels.

Poisoning of the squirrels is in charge of the biological survey, and according to the county agent, the animals are not as plentiful as in previous years.

According to Dr. A. E. Merkel,

county health officer, the rodent hosts may be checked by the spreading of poison grain of which Fowler has a quantity. The doctor advised careful handling of dead rodents on which the parasite fleas might be. The United States public health service through the state board of health has two units at work in the state where large numbers of the rodents are found.
