Jap Reception Camp Takes Shape in Tule Lake Basin

TULE LAKE CAMP SHIFTED MILE TO HIGHER GROUND

Klamath Falls, April 23.—(Spl.)—The Tulelake Japanese camp site was shifted a mile northeast Tuesday morning when soil and drainage conditions on the original grounds were found unsatisfactory.

Shift to the new location was accomplished almost without loss of construction stride. Buildings already started on the old site will be used as temporary quarters for construction workers.

The new site lies opposite the end of the peninsula, adjoining the east side of the highway. It is on a government lease now held by Liskey brothers, the land being described by the reclamation bureau as "cheap pasture."

No Crop Disruption

Meanwhile, it was stated by bureau officials they had been informed there will be no disruption of regular agricultural activity in the Tule lake basin this year through the location of the camp there.

B. E. Hayden, reclamation superintendent, said that farmers in that area will go ahead with their crops as usual. He added that it will probably be too late for an agricultural program in connection with the camp by the time evacuees are actually moved into the area.

The change to the new site

was decided upon, it was learned, because the barracks on the old site would be on ground that would be mushy a part of the year, and because drainage was not satisfactory for installation of sanitary facilities.

Firmer Ground

The new site is about seven miles south of Tulelake, adjoining the Klamath Falls-Reno highway, and it includes about 800 acres.

Hiring of men for the construction program proceeded at full speed Tuesday, with activity centered at the AFL hiring headquarters at Tulelake. Laborers, carpenters, welders and particularly mechanics with tools are wanted, it was stated at the Labor temple here. Interested men should apply at Tulelake, it was said.

Well drilling will continue on the original site. Water will be piped under the highway and the Southern Pacific railroad line to the new site.

Ickes Denies Extreme Cut Planned in East Coast Gas

Washington, April 23.—(AP)—Petroleum Coordinator Ickes declared today there was "no justification" for anticipating that eastern motorists would be limited to as little as 2½ to 3 gallons of gasoline a week.

Such figures had been mentioned as likely under the card rationing system announced yesterday by Price Administrator Leon Henderson, to be effective May 15 but Ickes told his press conference, "if we are able to carry out our plans there will be no such cut." He added: "We refuse to believe that people will be put on such short rations. Our objective is to supply as much gasoline as possible."

Ickes said he knew of no such figure having been discussed and did not contain the 2½-to-3-gallon figure.

Semi-official estimates of the probable ration allowances in the east had ranged from this figure to 25 gallons a month. Some OPA sources, not speaking officially, still clung today to the 2½-to-3 estimate and said it might well be less.

In discussing the rationing plan, heads of five top-ranking war agencies stated flatly in a joint statement that the government no longer would risk lives of American seamen on tankers "so someone will have gasoline to go to a bridge party or a ball game."

Ickes foresaw the likelihood of increased prices for gasoline and fuel oil in the east, saying that the petroleum industry had estimated its costs had been increased by \$300,000,000 annually.

BLAZE DESTROYS INDIGENT HOME

Roseburg, Ore., April 23.—(AP)—The Douglas county indigent home and hospital, located two miles east of Roseburg, was destroyed by fire shortly before noon today. Thirty-six patients, many of them helpless, were removed from the burning building without mishap, while nearly all furnishings and fixtures were saved.

The fire started on the roof of the two-story wooden structure, apparently as the result of sparks from the flue, according to R. T. Blakely, superintendent. The eight members of the staff were assisted by mechanics and warehousemen from the county shops, located about a quarter of a mile from the institution, in the removal of patients, prior to the arrival of the fire department and volunteer workers.

Father George Temple gave the small gem, her birthstone, in a ring.

But Shirley, a freshman ("I'm going on a sophomore," she insists) at Westlake School for Girls, is growing up.

"She's a little more independent," explained Mrs. Temple. "That is, she has ideas of her own. For instance, she likes to pick out her own clothes."

"In the past year she has acquired an appreciation for symphony music and we're glad that she has."

MOTHER OF F.D.R. LEFT \$1,089,872

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., April 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Sara Delano Roosevelt, mother of the president, left a net estate estimated at \$1,089,872, a New York state transfer tax appraisal showed today.

This figure was reached after deduction of funeral and administrative expenses and debts totaling \$38,489. A state tax of \$48,431 was imposed.

Under a will probated earlier, President Roosevelt receives nine-tenths of the entire estate and his mother's Hyde Park, N. Y., property.

Mrs. Roosevelt died last September 7 at Hyde Park.

German's Reserve Power Drained for Russian Front

STALINITES CLAIM ENOUGH STRENGTH TO MEET THREAT

Growing Nervousness Over Allied Invasion Threat Is Displayed in Hitlerland.

(By the Associated Press)
Adolf Hitler has called up 1,900,000 fresh reserves including teen-aged youths and now has nine-tenths of his fighting force massed on the Russian war front, an official soviet spokesman said today as Stockholm dispatches reported mounting German nervousness over the prospect of an allied invasion of Europe.

The soviet spokesman, S. A. Lozovsky, said the nazis reserves called to bolster Hitler's winter-battered armies included 900,000 youths of 17 and 18 years in two new military classes.

Meanwhile, British RAF warplanes celebrated the feast day of St. George, the patron saint of England, with a smashing new assault on the German industrial Rhineland and the docks at Le Havre in German-occupied France.

During the night, big guns on the English channel coast also boomed across Dover strait and continued firing for about 30 minutes.

The aerial thrusts against Adolf Hitler's Rhineland war foundries and Le Havre copped yesterday's spectacular raid by British Commandos who landed on the Nazi-occupied French "invasion coast" near Boulogne, cut German communications and probed enemy fortifications for two hours.

The Nazi high command acknowledged "some casualties" and material damage in western Germany, but declared that German night raiders struck back with an attack on an English south coast munitions factory which caused "violent explosions."

The Germans said five RAF bombers were shot down over the Reich; the British said four planes were missing.

Nazis Jitters
Stockholm advisers said German expectancy of an allied invasion of western Europe had increased considerably, with the Nazis taking feverish precautions along the entire "front" from the top of Norway to southern France.

The Berlin correspondent of the Stockholm newspaper Dagbladet reported that "certain optimists are convinced the British will come by May 1," and London papers said this was a feeler so obvious that Nazi anxiety must have dictated it.

Other signs of German "jitters" were reports that the Nazis had set 40,000 laborers to work on anti-invasion defenses in Norway and that German authorities in France had barred civilians from Normandy's coastal roads between 7:30 p. m. and 6 a. m.—leaving the clear assumption that any person abroad in the forbidden hours would be a British Commando or other foe, subject to being shot on sight.

On the Russian war front, soviet dispatches reported that the German armies in the Ukraine, heavily battered in recent weeks, had abandoned their counter-attacks and changed tactics to a defense of fortified positions.

The significance in this lay in well-informed military predictions that Hitler's long-heralded offensive would strike its heaviest blows on the southern flank, in a drive toward the oil-rich Caucasus. Now, according to the Russians, the Germans' preliminary "feeler" thrusts have been crushed and the Nazis forced back on the defensive.

Russian dispatches also reported that on the central (Moscow) front, at Yuhnov, thousands of nazis bodies had been found when the melting snows uncovered a huge pit in the central square of the town.

REIGN OF TERROR ON MADAGASCAR; JAPS MAY GET IT

Hundreds of De Gaulists Arrested—New French Role in War Is Emphasized.

A virtual reign of terror on the key French island of Madagascar, with the arrest of hundreds of De Gaulists, was reported today amid quickening speculation that France's new pro-German Premier Pierre Laval may be planning to turn the island over to Japan.

The world's fourth largest island, Madagascar lies off the east coast of Africa athwart vital allied lines of communication with India.

Not Defended
"Madagascar is not being defended against Japanese infiltration, and it cannot be defended against Japanese invasion," said dispatches reaching London.

France's new role in the war, particularly her collaboration with the axis, was sharply emphasized today by a series of developments:

1. The Union of South Africa, a part of the British Empire which would probably be given the task of dealing with Madagascar, broke off relations with Vichy.

It is about 800 miles from Durban, South Africa, to Madagascar.

2. In London, a British spokesman said "it is now reported that 50,000 tons of French shipping have been taken over by Japan."

3. High-ranking United States diplomats, it was disclosed, have been newly transferred to Brazzaville, in Free French West Africa, and to Nigeria and Liberia in an evident move to strengthen the U. S. diplomatic front in Africa.

Observers said these stations are usually assigned to newcomers.

4. In Vichy, Premier Laval himself received the Japanese ambassador-designate, Takonobu Mitani.

5. The Vichy government went to the length of issuing an official denial of Moscow radio reports that German sailors were arriving at the French Mediterranean naval base of Toulon and that French warships were being turned over to Germany.

The statement also denied reports "of a fight between French and German sailors."

Aussies and Dutch Fight On In Interior of Timor Island

Allied Headquarters, Australia, April 23.—(AP)—Australian and Dutch forces still are fighting in the interior of the half-Dutch, half-Portuguese island of Timor, some 400 miles off the northwest tip of Australia, an allied headquarters communique declared today.

The bulletin also announced that allied aircraft had made another attack yesterday on the Japanese base at Rabaul, New Britain, bombing docks and shore structures.

The assault followed a surprise attack on the same objective the previous afternoon, during which direct hits were scored on buildings, the communique added.

In reference to the situation in the Philippines, headquarters reported the Japanese had made intermittent divebombing attacks on Corregidor fortress, but declared that enemy aerial activity there was diminishing.

PICKETS PLACED BEFORE SAWMILL IN CENTRAL POINT

Labor Department Conciliator Fails To Iron Out Dispute With A.F.L. Workers.

Pickets were placed at the Southern Oregon Sugar Pine company mill at Central Point this morning following an unsuccessful attempt by a U. S. labor department conciliator, J. E. Jacobson, to mediate the dispute between the company and A. F. of L. sawmill workers, according to J. G. Wolf, local union representative.

Although Chauncey Florey, manager of the mill, could not be reached for a statement, it was believed that operations at the mill were continuing. The company has an A-I-A priority rating on orders for lumber to be used in the repair of Pearl Harbor.

Wolf stated that charges of unfair labor practices, alleging discrimination, coercion and intimidation have been filed against the company with the National Labor Relations board.

"With a few exceptions," Wolf stated, "all the company's Central Point employees joined the union several months ago, and when the union asked that the company recognize it as the bargaining agency Manager Florey indicated that he had never dealt with a labor organization and did not intend to do so."

"This was followed by discrimination against union workers by the company and some of its supervisors," Wolf continued, "which was climaxed last Monday when the company transferred from the day to the night shift a number of leaders of the union who had seniority rights, replacing them on their day jobs with newly-hired non-union members and causing the walk-out of all union members."
