AXIS SUBMARINES THOUGHT LOST IN ATLANTIC ATTACKS

Norfolk, Va., April 25.—(P)—Three axis submarines, in a torpedo and shelling attack, set fire to an American cargo-passenger ship off the Atlantic coast Tuesday night in one of two sinkings announced today by navy officials who said 44 passengers and crewmen were either lost or not reported from the two vessels.

Nine passengers and five crew members were missing and presumed lost from the cargo-passenger ship, and three men were missing and 27 others had not been reported as rescued after a medium-sized cargo ship was sunk Sunday night.

Survivors related that the score was not altogether one-sided and that one or two of the submarines attacking the cargo-passenger ship were believed to have been sunk. Lawrence W. Earle, 18-year-old son of Pennsylvania's former governor, George H. Earle, said he was told by the crew of their rescue vessel that they had certainly destroyed one of the raiders and probably another.

Miguel Marcano, a student at Louisiana State university, said he was aboard a rescue ship when it dropped depth bombs, and "when he saw oil and smoke spurt up, the men on the ship grabbed each other by the shoulders, jumping up and down, yelling we got one! We got one!"

The 95 passengers and 75 crewmen surviving the attack on the cargo-passenger ship were adrift for 18 hours in six lifeboats before they were rescued.

DRUNKEN DRIVER GIVEN JAIL TERM

James Kellen was fined \$100 and sentenced to 50 days in jail in city court Friday for operating a vehicle while intoxicated. His operator's license was revoked for one year. The jail sentence was to be suspended upon payment of the fine.

Kellen is said to have collided with the parked machine of John Conrad, 344 Bartlett street, on Riverside avenue near Jackson boulevard Thursday evening.

RUSSIAN CAVALRY HARASSES NAZIS

Kulbyshev, April 25.—(P)—Red army cavalry units, scorned the spring swamps which have bogged down other ground forces, have taken a number of German-occupied villages and reached an important highway feeding the German front, dispatches to Izvestia said today.

The horsemen were reported to be harassing the Germans at every turn by lightning raids on villages despite the efforts of German planes and artillery to check them.

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FAMOUS REPORTER LONG IN ORIENT, TO TALK MONDAY

Reporting world shaking news events from Africa, Germany, Russia and finally 13 years of hop, skip and jump in Japan and China is the background of James R. Young who will lecture here Monday at the high school auditorium under the auspices of the Jackson County League of Women Voters.

Jimmy Young ended his Far East career with 61 days of solitary confinement in a Japanese prison. Two fellow correspondents never came out alive. Others, working in terror ridden Shanghai, were carrying revolvers, wearing 40-pound steel vests, hiring bodyguards and riding in bullet proof automobiles when Young decided it was time to head for the United States.

He is on leave of absence from International News Service during a lecture tour of the nation and in addition to a current best seller "Behind the Rising Sun", he is pouring out reams of magazine articles on an old but steady portable which, he explains, has enabled him to write many a strange story of fantastic Oriental affairs.

Tickets for Mr. Young's lecture are on sale by league members, at the Baldwin Piano Shoppe and will be sold at the door Monday night.

OVERPARKED CARS FACE ARREST IN POLICE WARNING

"Over-parking violations will be treated the same as any other traffic offense, by issuance of a complaint and the violator's appearance in police court," according to a statement from city police yesterday requesting stricter compliance with parking regulations of the downtown area.

This action results from the large number of complaints received by police concerning the lack of parking space arising from congestion caused by war construction activities.

Conferees attended by members of the public safety committee of the city council and by police have suggested that much of the trouble is from disregard of rules governing overtime parking. Establishment of 15-minute parking zones has not entirely eased the matter.

To familiarize the public with the ordinance governing parking in the business area a portion follows:

"Section 2. Parking Time Limits.

(a) The lawful time allowed for parking vehicles shall, in any section of any street, be as indicated by lettering upon the face of painted signs placed at the top of standards placed along the curb line of any section of any street. Such time limits and indication thereof may be changed from time to time by resolution. Such time limits shall mean the aggregate of time of all parking of any one vehicle within a space of 300 feet measured along the curb line and shall not exceed the time limit posted.

(b) Such time limits shall not apply on Sundays or legal holidays or between the hours of 6 p. m. and 8 a. m."

JAPANESE DRIVE MENACES ALLIED CENTER IN BURMA

New Delhi, India, April 25.—(P)—The hard-pressed Chinese defending the allied left flank counterattacked tonight to halt a Japanese drive six miles west of Taunggyi, but the strongly reinforced enemy struck furiously with tanks, artillery and planes on both sides of their stalled comrades.

The Japanese, striking through the Shan states within 100 miles of devastated Mandalay, thrust forward in three columns around Taunggyi in an effort to encircle the outnumbered troops under Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, U. S. A.

One Japanese spearhead which reached Hopong drove abruptly northeast in the direction of Loleim, 22 miles away, while another column sought to move west and encircle Taunggyi. Still a third unit was striking out 16 miles further west of Taunggyi.

The Chinese of the center and their British allies were reported officially to have held their positions. The central front is south of Tatkon and the British are drawn up behind the Pin-

chaung river near the burned oil center of Yenangyaung.
