

State Varsity and Freshmen Squads Down Oregon in Relay Races

HIGH JUMP RELAY ONLY CONTEST TO THREATEN RECORD

Webfeet Forfeit Three Events—Weather Conditions Unfavorable.

Corvallis, Ore., April 25.—(AP)—Oregon State colleg made a clean sweep of varsity and freshmen relay meets with the University of Oregon here today, the Beaver varsity winning, 5-3, and the Rooks edging the Oregon Frosh, 3-2.

Coach Bill Hayward's undermanned varsity could not muster enough runners to compete in the 2-mile and 4-mile events nor could the Ducklings furnish enough manpower for the freshman 3-mile. Oregon forfeited all three events.

The two varsity events finally were run as half-mile and mile relays and Oregon State took first place in both.

Nearest thing to a record performance, under weather conditions that were unfavorable, was in the high jump. The Beaver varsity piled up a total of 23 feet 7 inches, one inch under the meet record set by Oregon State in 1940.

The Webfoot varsity took the shuttle hurdle and shotput handily, but was pressed to win the mile relay.

In the freshman meet Oregon State won the mile, 3-mile and medley relays while the Ducklings took the 440 and 880.
