Washington, April 25.—(P)—A senate committee was told today that a patent on a small screw or fastener—about the size of a man's little finger—had seriously impeded the production of military aircraft in the United States.

Thurman Arnold, assistant attorney general, said that because of the patent, "at one plant 80 airplanes were delayed in their production; at another plant the same thing happened to 20 flying fortresses, and at still another plant the entire assembly line was shut down for lack of the single item."
