The month of May will bring to Medford the annual observance of National Music week and under the direction of Mrs. Darrell Huson, an interesting program, varied in scope, will be presented to Medford residents. The opening program will be a 4 o'clock vesper musical at the Methodist church auditorium next Sunday afternoon. This is being arranged by Miss Miriam Burton.

Theme for National Music week this year is "Fostering Hemisphere Solidarity Through Inter-American Music." Music provides a common bond and a universal language which should help to strengthen the ties between the inter-American republics state and national, committee heads state.

C. M. Tremaine, secretary of the national music week organization, said "We all recognize music as a stimulating, strengthening unifying force. Let us, and all who feel as we do, use it as such, in our community, our state, our nation and in all other American republics and Canada. Let us promote this fortifying power of music in the factory, on the farm, in the home, in the public gatherings and urge affiliated organizations to do likewise."

Disturbing developments in world conditions have brought about a need for American unity and cooperative spirit not only in this country but the western hemisphere and the allies. To develop this spirit the committee has designated and recommended to participants in the 1942 observance two keynotes, "American Unity Through Music" and "Music Maintains Morale." To this end the local committee is working and programs to be available during the week will be announced later.
