IN DEFENSE OF PURE NIGHT AIR

When is a draft? That must be clearly understood before either of us can know what the other is talking about.

A draft is something more than just air in motion. It is a current of air you can feel, whether it be hot or cold, damp or dry. Whether you can feel it depends chiefly on the velocity of the air current.

Fresh air or ventilation in a room or enclosure of any description implies air in motion. If the air stands still or stagnates it soon becomes "foul" or depressing.

Probably (I can find no scientific evidence on this point) some persons are actually more sensitive to motion of the air, can feel a current of air upon the skin which is so gentle that it is imperceptible to others. Not particularly cold or damp air, just air. The fancies of "somebody who knows" have no weight as evidence on this point. Confirmed mollycoddies detect imaginary drafts when normal folk are perfectly comfortable.

I would not advise anybody to sleep in a draft. But I like to sleep that way myself, that is, when I can be comfortable in bed. If the wind or draft blowing on me makes me so cold I can't sleep, you bet I shut it out or fend it off. If I possibly can. But if I can keep nice and warm in bed with a young gale blowing over me I feel perfectly safe. For I'm sure the fresh night air blowing in so freely is better for breathing than any artificially conditioned air can be, and in addition I am sure the air I breathe will not be polluted or contaminated by any accidental escape of gas or by carbon monoxide from some faulty burner or furnace or vent or flue. In the morning I awaken refreshed and feeling fit, not

drill, thickheaded as one who sleeps in a poorly ventilated room is likely to.

I would never advise anybody to sleep in a draft. I would advise everybody to pay no attention to drafts, and sleep in a well ventilated place and always sleep comfortable.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Is it dangerous to take clothing home from a sanatorium to launder. The patient is supposed to have lung trouble. (Miss A. C.)

Answer—Soap and water is a dependable disinfectant for clothes, no matter what infectious or contagious disease the patient may have. Of course if the clothes are boiled that alone would disinfect them. Ironing sterilizes clothes. There is practically no danger in taking home clothing worn by a tuberculosis patient, for home laundering.

I am indebted to your fine health teachings for many things, not the least of which is freeing me from lifelong dependence on physics and enemas. For more than eight years now I have not resorted to any such artificial aid, thanks to your pamphlet on that subject. (J. M. B.)

Tuberculin Test

School children receive skin tests for tuberculosis. One physician says this is a reliable test another says it is a "poor" tuberculin test. Does it mean anything? (S. S.)

Answer—A "positive" reaction in children under fourteen is a fair indication of active tuberculosis. After that age, it becomes less significant, as most adults harbor latent or inactive tuberculosis somewhere in the body anyway. The skin test is valuable in connection with other evidence (physical examination, X-ray of chest) for finding the children who require special preventive treatment.

Trickle

Every winter I have a bronchial cold, cough seems to be caused by constant trickle in my throat. (C. A.)

Answer—While it may be due to chronic sinusitis, there is but one way to deal with it—have an examination by nose and throat physician. (Copyright 1942, John P. Dille Co.)

without the formality of taking out a policy, provided the raid and damage occur before July 1. After that date there will be a new set-up and private companies will participate. Insurance representatives from Washington and Oregon have been in the capital discussing the matter with RFC.

The exact plan has not been worked out; three plans are now under consideration, but it looks as though insurance agents will enjoy a thriving business in the target area. The margin they will work on will be very slim, but there will be little difficulty in signing up policies. Federal government, in any event, will be carrying the bag. It is expected that private timber owners will buy all the protection they can afford, for incendiary bombs are their greatest menace. Next will be public utilities, and municipalities buying war risk insurance for the protection of their water supply, and sawmills.

Rate of insurance will be the same whether it is taken out on property in Astoria, Bellingham or in the safer areas of Kansas City or Chicago.

AT the moment, five planes (pursuit, interceptor and bomber) are being produced every hour of the day, or 120 each 24 hours; 3,600 planes a month. At this rate there will be 43,200 produced in a 12-month period, but as the assembly plants speed up—and some are using the assembly line technique—this number will be greatly increased; will probably reach 65,000 this year, the goal set by President Roosevelt. It has been the policy not to particularize on plane production, but Speaker Rayburn has announced publicly that 3,600 planes a month is the current production. A good percentage of the bombers are coming from the Boeing plant on Puget sound.

DRAFT boards are receiving information to be used for deferment of skilled farm workers who, if they went into service, would decrease farm production. Most essential to the victory food
