SPRING! The dentist had filled my mouth with button hooks and nail files and was contentedly grinding away on a tooth. Through the open window were blown the scents of a city spring—carbon monoxide, warm asphalt, roast beef sandwiches. "Ah-Spring!" exclaimed the dentist. "What it remind you of?"

WALTER WHITBECK DEMO. ASPIRANT FOR SENATE SEAT

Walter W. Whitbeck of Portland, candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator in the coming primary, was born in St. Paul, Minn., in 1892 and moved to

Clackamas county, Oregon, in 1910. He served as a sergeant major, chief engineer, in the 321st motor transport corps in World war I.

Following the war he was employed as a labor agent for several railroad companies and logging concerns. In 1924 he entered the insurance business, in which he is still engaged.

He is married and has six children, one of his sons now being in the army.

Mr. Whitbeck is a member of the American Legion, Eagles, Jackson club, Willamette society, Democratic central committee and several old age pension groups.

His platform includes: "Rehabilitation of men disabled or maimed in the armed services."

"Proper hospitalization and medical care for all veterans (sadly neglected after the last war)."

"Permanent world peace after the world war in compliance with President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, Atlantic charter."

"Retention of the National Wagner Labor Relations act."

"Social Security act to be amended providing for a national old age pension act in cooperation with the states, providing the sum of \$40 monthly."

"Stabilization farm act to provide for a national cooperative marketing system, thereby stabilizing prices which will directly aid the farmer and the cattle raiser."

"Extension of Bonneville and Grand Coulee transmission lines providing power to various communities of our state."

"Our state has been sadly neglected from a national standpoint and many large industries and payrolls have slipped from our grasp. We recently lost the large aluminum plant due to the inability of our national officers to function properly."

"My slogan reads as follows: Loyalty and devotion to my government, my president and our people."

Water Conservation Urged By Cordy As Shortage Indicated
April 1 water forecasts indicate that if the spring and summer are hot and dry there may be a material shortage of

irrigation water, particularly in the Medford irrigation district, states C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent.

With normal spring rains the shortage will not be severe, but every effort should be made to conserve stored irrigation water. Steps that will help save stored water are full use of available flood water, clean cultivation, and cleaning of irrigation ditches.

The first cover spray will have to be completed about May 12 to 15. This is a preliminary date to aid in determining when to use flood water. Orchards with cover crops are now quite dry and an irrigation with flood water between the cays and first cover sprays would be desirable.

If the soil is not too dry the cover crop should be turned under before irrigating. If this is not practical, the orchard should be cultivated as soon as it is dry enough after irrigating.

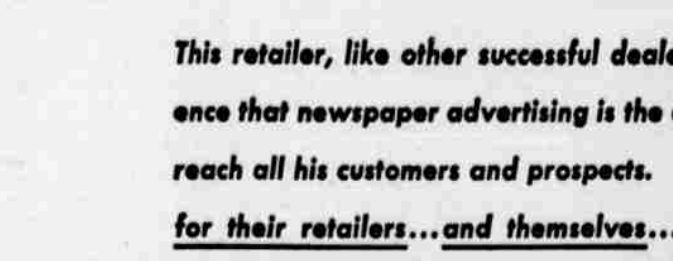
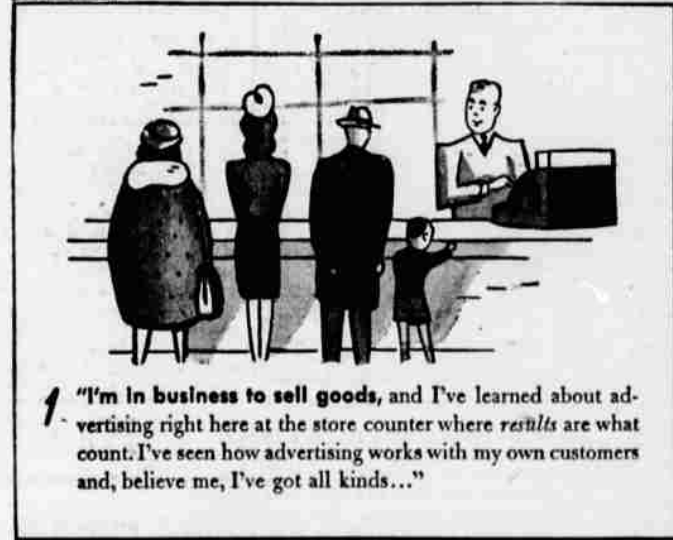
