WHEAT MARKETING VOTE IMPORTANT

Every Jackson county farmer who has over 15 acres of wheat seeded this year is eligible to vote at the referendum on wheat marketing quotas May 2, according to Fred C. Homes, chairman

of the county AAA committee. In reviewing marketing quota regulations, the chairman pointed out that all persons who have an interest in the wheat crop on an eligible farm may vote and because of Oregon's community property law this includes wives who own farms jointly with their husbands.

Stressing the importance of every eligible voter casting his ballot, the chairman announced that absentee voters and resident voters who will not be in the county on referendum day may vote either by mail or at the county AAA office during the week preceding May 2.

Persons voting by mail may obtain a ballot from the nearest county AAA office. They should mark and sign the ballot and put it in the mails in time to be received by the county office in which the farm is located before 9 p. m. on May 2, the chairman said.

PUBLIC ASKED TO AID NAVY RELIEF FUND CAMPAIGN

T. E. Daniels Chairman for Northern Jackson County; National Quota 5 Million.

Jackson county's campaign to raise its quota of the National Navy Relief society drive for \$5,000,000 is being organized with the drive planned for the first two weeks in May. The campaign has the hearty endorsement of President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox.

Navy relief funds are used exclusively for benefit of the dependent widows, minor orphan children and mothers of deceased officers and enlisted men in the navy, marine corps and coast guard and are for immediate financial aid not provided for in the form of pensions. Much of this aid must be given the families immediately, long before regular government allotments can be properly authorized. The funds will also take care of hospital expenses in the families of deceased service men in these branches and provide educational benefits for their orphaned children. Knowledge of these assured benefits to their families is greatly heartening to the brave men of the navy, marine corps and coast guard.

Losses Heavy Up to this time, since its organization in 1820, the navy relief society has taken pride in being self sustaining from funds subscribed by its own personnel. With the loss of 2897 men killed and 946 injured at Pearl Harbor in a few hours, more casualties than were sustained by the navy during the entire Spanish-American and World War I combined, and a navy enlarged to 500,000 men, the organization can no longer be self sustaining. Every true American is expected to welcome the opportunity to contribute to the fund.

National publicity on the campaign has already been released to the press, screen and radio throughout the nation. Further local information, including committee personnel and organization plans for Jackson county, will be released through the press and on the radio. T. E. Daniels has been appointed chairman for northern Jackson county.

Patriotic citizens desirous of assisting in the drive will be welcomed by the committee. Headquarters and telephone

BROTHERHOOD OF METHODIST MEN ORGANIZED HERE

After the dinner a short address will be given by Dr. Frank Roberts on the need of such a movement. Special music will consist of two men's quartet numbers and a solo by Clarence Meeker. Following the musical numbers a special address will be delivered by Ernest Peterson, church editor of the Oregon Journal of Portland and a widely known national Methodist layman. Mr. Peterson will speak from first-hand knowledge of inside news concerning war preparations. He, with other reporters, was permitted by the government recently to visit ammunition factories and airplane plants in the east. Many of these facts are unprinted but are permitted to be given to patriotic groups.

The men of the community are invited to hear Mr. Peterson and may secure tickets for the banquet by phoning reservations to the pastor of the church. Those who cannot attend the dinner are welcome to come at 7:30 to hear the speaker.

To the Public

The dispute between Southern Oregon Sugar Pine Co., Central Point, and its employees, which is interfering with production of essential war materials, is now entering its second week. The citizens of this community, particularly, have a right to resent this interference, and they are likewise entitled to know who is responsible for this deplorable situation.

During February, 1942, this company's employees decided to establish an A. F. of L. union. Practically all of them joined at that time. When a representative of the union informed the employer of this he expressed bitterness, and was resentful of the fact that his employees had organized.

Immediately following, and up to April 20, when a walk-out occurred in protest to widespread further discriminations against union members, a program of pressure and discrimination against these members was carried on by the company and its representatives, as we shall prove in government action which the union hopes will be taken against the company. Wages are not involved.

On April 21, the day following the walk-out, a Conciliator for the U. S. Department of Labor, met in joint session with representatives of management and the union. As a result of this meeting the Conciliator recommended that the men return to work, status quo, and that both sides accept mediation as a basis of settlement of all points in dispute. This plan, which the union readily accepted, was flatly rejected by management.

On April 22, the Director of U. S. Conciliation Service, Washington, D. C., demanded that both the company and union accept a similar proposal. In reply, the union renewed its acceptance of the Government's proposal, and also demanded that a just settlement be FORCED upon both parties.

The responsibility for interference with war production in this case rests squarely upon management of Southern Oregon Sugar Pine Co., as we feel sure further government action will develop, and we ask that the public withhold judgment until the facts are disclosed as a result of hearings which are pending.
