

DRUNKEN DRIVERS GIVEN \$100 FINE, LICENSE REVOKED

One Captured After Nearly
Running Policeman Down
In Wild Main Street Drive.

Thomas W. Mosely, a cantonment worker, charged with driving an auto while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, entered a plea of guilty in justice court yesterday. He was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, and fined \$100 and costs. Upon payment of the fine and costs of \$104.50, the all sentence was suspended. His liquor and auto licenses were suspended for a year.

Mosely in a wild drive down Main street early Sunday, was chased by a sheriff patrol car. He nearly ran over Night Policeman Gearhart, while crossing a street. The officer leaped in time. At Main and Central avenue Mosely went through a red light, and was halted a short time later.

Marvin E. Colvin, also charged with driving while drunk, was sentenced to 40 days in the county jail, fined \$100 and costs, and his liquor and auto licenses were suspended for a year. He is held in the county jail. He is a camp worker.

Richard R. Garrett of Jacksonville, charged with being drunk on a public highway was fined \$10 and costs, and sentenced to 30 hours in the county jail. Garrett was a passenger in the auto wrecked near Bybee Corner Saturday night in which Archie L. Hall, 22, of Trail was killed. The jail sentence was imposed so the authorities could investigate phases of the accident.

Two in Ashland
In Ashland justice court yesterday Jerome J. Rabindeau, charged with intoxication on the public highway was fined \$25 and costs. Rabindeau reportedly wrecked his auto on Billings hill near Ashland.

Luis R. Garcia, 22, charged with the attempted larceny of an auto in Ashland last Saturday night, appeared in court yesterday, but was given until today to decide whether he would plead guilty or waive preliminary hearing. Authorities said Garcia had attempted to steal three parked cars, but only succeeded in starting one of them.

Waldo W. Meikle, route 1, Medford, charged with having no auto license plates, was fined \$1 and costs. L. E. Hughes charged with overwidth load on a truck was fined \$1.50 and costs.

BOND CHAIRMEN PLAN CAMPAIGN

Portland, April 28—(AP)—A state-wide meeting of county chairmen of the war savings bond staff will lay plans Friday and Saturday for meeting Oregon's quota of \$100,000,000 in the next year.

Ray Conway, state administrator, said immediate plans would be for raising the May quota of \$5,000,000. The monthly quota is to be stabilized in July at \$10,000,000, he said.

In addition to all county chairmen, other committee members, civic officials, bank heads and newspaper men will attend. They will be guests at a banquet Friday and on Saturday will be introduced at the Victory Center and at the Paramount theater. They will visit the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation yards and the Portland air base.

MINE ASSESSMENT WAIVER DUE SOON

Washington, April 28—(AP)—Final congressional action was expected in the near future on a bill (HR 6604) by Representative O'Connor (D-Mont.) to suspend annual assessment work on mining claims in the United States and Alaska until July 1, 1943.

The house bill was passed yesterday by the senate after Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) offered an amendment to strike out a provision limiting the number of claims to which the suspension would apply, and it was returned to the house.

Under existing law \$100 worth of labor must be performed or \$100 worth of improvements must be made annually during each year preceding July 1.

Failure to comply would permit others to file on the claim in the United States, and in Alaska the claim would revert to the federal government.

Klamath Second in Pedestrian Safety

Washington, April 28—(AP)—Oregon won first place in the third national pedestrian protection contest the sponsoring American Automobile Association announced last night.

SEARS ROEBUCK HIT BY
SALES LOSS DUE TO WAR
New York, April 28—(AP)—Robert E. Wood, chairman of Sears Roebuck & Co., told stockholders today the huge mail order concern had lost about \$100,000,000 in sales as a result of the war.

Six lines of business which formerly accounted for a large part of total volume have been about wiped out—refrigerators, tires, stoves, washing machines, electrical appliances and radios.

AMERICAN OFFICER NOW HEADS ICELAND FORCES

Washington, April 28—(AP)—Major General Charles H. Bonesteel of the United States army has taken over from British Major General Henry Osborne Curtis as commander of all United Nations' forces in Iceland.

The war department announced the change late yesterday but gave no indication of whether British troops were being withdrawn.

COASTAL STATES LEAD NATION IN MASS EDUCATION

Lowest Proportion of Persons Who Had Completed Less Than 5 Years School

Washington, April 28—(AP)—The census bureau, in the first complete inventory of the educational status of the entire population today announced that the three Pacific coast states had the highest median number of school years completed of any of the geographic divisions of the nation. It was based on persons 25 or older.

The three states had a median of 9.7 years, meaning that one half their population 25 years old or older had more than that number of years of schooling and half had less. The national median was 8.4 years. The District of Columbia had the highest median (10.3) closely pressed by Utah's 10.2. Lowest was Louisiana's 6.6 years.

California led the coast with 9.9; Washington, Oregon each had 9.1 years.

College Average High
The three west coast states also had the lowest proportion of persons who had completed less than five years of schooling (6.4 per cent) and the highest proportion of college graduates of any geographic division of the country.

Reciting that Utah's population is 92.8 per cent native white and that most other intermountain states (New Mexico excepted) also ranked high, the bureau said "the race nativity composition of the west is undoubtedly an important factor in the high educational development of its population. Native whites comprised 85.9 per cent of the total population there, as compared with 83.9 per cent for the north and 74.5 per cent for the south."

Many to High School
Dividing the nation into the north, the south and the west, the study showed that but 8.3 per cent of the population 25 or older in the west had completed less than five years' schooling, top 10.1 per cent in the north, and 22.9 per cent in the south.

Of Oregon's 675,519 in the survey, 28,404 had 1 to 4 years' schooling; 42,416 had completed the 5th and 6th grades; 252,466 had completed the 8 grades; 116,758 stopped after two years high school; 126,247 had completed high school; 57,709 had one to three years of college, and 36,757 had four or more years of college work. Unreported were 8,057.

Seattle Japanese Start Evacuation

Seattle, April 28—(AP)—The army started evacuation of Seattle Japanese today when an advance cadre of 500, alien and American-born, mostly skilled workers, moved by automobile to the big new assembly center at the Western Washington fairgrounds, Puyallup.

About 2,500 more will be moved within the next three days, to be followed by others from Seattle and other areas of northwestern Washington and about 200 from Alaska.

2 Killed, 2 Wounded in Heated Argument Over "Fighting Japs"

Wallace, Idaho, April 28—(AP)—A beer hall argument over "fighting the Japs," which brought death to two men and possibly fatal wounds to two more was written off the sheriff's books today as finished.

The end came late yesterday with the finding by Sheriff Archie McPhail and a posse of the body of Andrew Maki, 27-year-old miner, a principal in the argument who had been hunted a night and a day for the slaying of Wesley Barker,

37, Enaville logger, and the critical wounding of Sulo Maki, no relation of Andrew's and Henry Davenport, 65.

Maki shot himself through the head with the same revolver he used to shoot the others, the sheriff said, as the posse surrounded the barn where he lived about a mile from Enaville and began to close in after hunting in vain through the surrounding forests all day long.

Salem, April 28—(AP)—The state highway commission will meet in Portland Thursday to open bids on nearly \$1,000,000 worth of road projects, including a contract for improvement of the Pacific highway west in the Camp Adair area.

NORTH CALIFORNIA JAPS ROUNDED UP

San Francisco, April 28—(AP)—In its first big series of raids in northern California this month, FBI agents today moved concertedly against potentially dangerous Japanese aliens in 24 cities and towns in 16 counties.

More than 100 officers, including police and sheriff's deputies from 21 different law enforcement agencies joined in the raids.

Nat J. L. Pieper, special agent

in charge of the San Francisco FBI office said the raids were directed primarily against known members of Japanese nationalist organizations, those who had military training in Japan, Buddhist priests, members of the military virtue society, instructors in Japanese language schools, and collectors of Hemusha Kai which has gathered money in this country for the Japanese war chest.

Albany, Ore., April 28—(AP)—Ervin D. Berlincourt hammered away at the home he is building here. His revolver was dislodged from a rafter, fell to the floor and discharged. Berlincourt was hospitalized with a serious wound.
