## NEW USO CENTER BEING READIED FOR OCCUPANCY

Workers are busy at the temporary United Service Organization center on Main and Bartlett streets making necessary alterations and repairs on the building which will be opened soon as a recreational spot for U. S. armed forces and defense workers.

Introduced yesterday at the center where the first USO service council meeting was held were Mrs. Helen Johnson Small of Ria Vista, Cal., and Mrs. Penny Fontaine of Bogota, Columbia. Mrs. Small will serve as director of Medford USO, her appointment having been made by the Young Women's Christian association and Mrs. Fontaine will act as USO program director.

Mrs. Dolph Phipps, who is local chairman of the USO council, which will serve as a liaison agency between USO and the community, presided during the short business session. She introduced members of the council which is comprised of representative community groups and explained briefly duties of each member.

**Problems Studied**  
Mrs. Small expressed her pleasure in arriving in southern Oregon and said that she was "here to serve the council and the boys." Enroute west recently Mrs. Small said she had picked up many defense workers and soldiers in an effort to understand their vital problems and reactions to various groups and the USO which has been organized throughout the country to assist them with housing, recreations and many other activities.

She said that after her contact with these workers and soldiers she was confident it would be the human touch behind the scenes that solved their problems. Mrs. Small pointed out that "we are now in an era of group thinking" and that problems will be worked out by communities rather than individual persons as was the case in World War I.

Mrs. Fontaine, who has been engaged in community recreational work in South America, said success of her work depended on the cooperation of city and community groups. She said that she was confident that her background would be of valuable help in her local USO position.

Lyle Schoppert, advertising manager, installed the patriotic display which has a sky blue panel as the background for the American flag. A model in a Red Cross nurse's uniform stands at the right. In the foreground is a white flag with a War Savings Stamp message and the pledge of allegiance to the United States is printed on a smaller blue flag.

"If more people would stop and think of the tremendous costs of war they would buy more stamps and bonds," Mr. Brown remarked as he inspected the completed display. "One propeller for a four-motored bomber can cost as much as \$8,000. All of the machinery of war costs money—lots of money and it must be contributed by every individual in the whole country."

## OSC GRADUATION IS STREAMLINED

Corvallis, May 29.—(AP)—Oregon State's first wartime commencement since June, 1918, will be staged under a streamline schedule opening with baccalaureate service at 8 p. m., today instead of Sunday. Graduation exercises will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday, instead of Monday.

Another innovation for the 751 to receive degrees will be the appearance of all graduates of the R. O. T. C. four-year course in uniform instead of the traditional cap and gown.

Sixty-one students will receive special senior honors for outstanding scholarship, including: Jack W. Peterson, and Earle Chamberlain, Ashland, engineering, Home economics, Mary Dal-laire, Medford.
