

VANCOUVER BOOM TANGLES TOWN IN HOUSING PROBLEM

Once Serene City Believed
Having Fastest Population
Growth in Nation.

Vancouver, Wash., May 29.—(AP)—This once serene city now being re-born into a war-boom town with perhaps the nation's top per capita population gain, was tangled today in a housing development nothing short of fantastic.

At the request of the Kaiser Shipyard Company, the Vancouver housing authority is trying to erect 13,500 houses and a colony of dormitories for shipyard workers soon to number 36,000—and perhaps more.

A year ago Vancouver's 18,000 residents lived roomily in 6,000 homes and a few apartments.

Then the boom began. The fast-building Kaiser Company located a shipyard here and said it would be going full-blast by winter, employing 20,000.

Vancouver took a deep breath and prepared. As fast as housing blueprints jelled, shipyard blueprints were expanded. Now the shipyards are up to 12 ways and the labor needs up to 36,000 men.

Twice As Tough
Almost before a stick of lumber was ordered, the housing problem had become twice as tough.

The Vancouver housing authority raced up five dormitories, costing about 2,000,000 in five weeks.

Five thousand houses sprouted through the spring rains before lumber freezing and priority troubles. Six hundred were to have been ready by next month. Before materials were thawed out, the schedule was 30 days behind.

The authority got approval for another 5,000 houses and five more dormitories. These would have put the authority within 3,500 houses of its goal—13,500 houses, plus dormitories, at a cost to Uncle Sam of around \$55,000,000, and all in one year.

Yesterday the Kaiser Company moved the end of the rainbow back another notch; said maybe the ultimate would be 45,000 men and 18,500 houses.

This town used to get excited when a sawmill added a second shift.

BERRY GROWERS STYMIED BY OPA

Salem, May 29.—(AP)—Altho the strawberry canning season will open early next week, growers still were pressing the office of price administration to set a price for their crop.

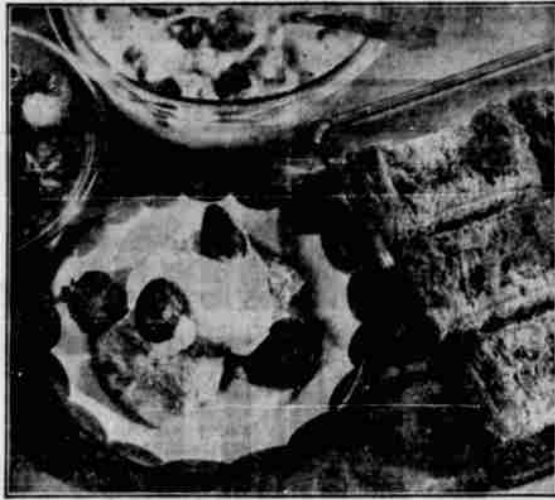
A representative of the OPA assured the growers committee nine days ago that a price would be set by May 22, George Tate, chairman of the growers committee, said.

Ashland, May 29.—(Spl.)—Ashland is now included and is an official part of the Camp White critical defense housing area, according to an official announcement received from Folger Johnson, Oregon federal housing administrator.

No city or community is included in an official critical defense housing area unless it offers a 40c minimum round-trip commute rate to the army installation or war industry, the 40c being es-

American Potato Salad
Serves 8

1/2 cup diced bacon
1/2 cup chopped onions
1/2 cup chopped green peppers
1 cup cubed cooked potatoes
1 cup diced celery
4 hard-cooked eggs, diced
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 cup salad dressing
Cook bacon, onions and peppers 10 minutes in frying pan over low heat. Pour over potatoes, mixing with fork until blended. Let stand 5 minutes, add rest of ingredients. Chill. Serve in bowl lined with crisp salad greens.
Ham Salad Sandwiches (15)
1 cup cubed cooked ham
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 cup chopped pickles (sweet or sour)
4 olives, chopped
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
4 tablespoons salad dressing
Mix ingredients with fork. Chill. Spread on buttered slices of bread. Add bits of shredded lettuce or cross or nasturtium leaves.
Honey Oatmeal Cookies
(Mollet And Fruity)
2-3 cup fat

1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
1-3 cup orange juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup strained honey
3 cups flour

2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons baking powder
2 cups rolled oats, toasted (uncooked breakfast cereal)
1 cup chopped raisins
1 cup chopped prunes or figs

1/2 cup chopped salted peanuts
Cream fat and sugar, add eggs, extract, juice, salt and honey. Beat 2 minutes. Mix in rest of ingredients. Drop portions onto greased baking sheets. Flatten each cookie. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven (350).
