Six Die in Smashup of 2-Motor Bomber On Training Flight

Denver, May 29.—(P)—Lowry Field officials announced that a plane which crashed and burned near LaSalle, Colo., today, killing at least six persons, was a two-engine medium bomber on a routine training flight from Lowry.

The craft took off from the U. S. army air school at 9:18 a. m. and crashed about 10 o'clock, officials said.

The dead included: Corp. James O. Flourney, Pvt. Louis Garcia, Pvt. Alex Chavarria, Edwin P. Kelly, civilian employee at the air school.

Names of the pilot and copilot were withheld pending further examination of the wreckage. Lowry officials said.
