Reds Will Open
Baseball Camp
Here Wednesday

Time was when a youngster aspiring to break into organized baseball, with a major league career his eventual goal, had to put the "touch" on papa for the necessary fare to reach a spring training camp, and in general go through "hell and high water" to get a chance to display his ability before the proper eyes.

All that has changed now. Fierce competition among the big league clubs to sign promising young players has resulted in the professional teams bringing trout camps to the pastimes and THE leader in this method of discovering potential major leaguers is Cincinnati, National league champion in 1939 and 1940.

Starting next Wednesday morning at the high school park the Reds will conduct their annual trout camp for young players in this area. It will last through Sunday, five days, and will be one of 26 similar camps to be held west of the Mississippi river this spring and summer.

In charge of the camp will be George (Mickey) Shader, Pacific coast scout for the Redlegs, who is expected to arrive in town tomorrow to get things in shape for the sessions. E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, has turned over to Shader all facilities at the fine high school athletic plant, as he has graciously done at all previous camps.

The camp will be absolutely free, and those enrolling must provide only their own gloves and shoes, and transportation and living expenses if they reside outside Medford. The Reds will furnish all other equipment necessary in the staging of daily nine-inning games among the enrollees.

Aspirants showing sufficient promise will be tendered contracts with one of Cincinnati's minor league clubs. This is the way the Reds acquired such present-day stars as Harry Craft, Frank McCormick, Whitey Moore, Junior Thompson and Ray Lamman, the current Cincinnati rookie catcher whose hitting is setting the National league afire.

Shader cordially invites all players between 17 and 21 to enroll in the camp. Enrollment blanks may be obtained from the writer of this column, or from Shader at 10 a. m. next Wednesday at the high school park, when the camp will officially open.

The Boston Red Sox come close to being the worst road team in the major leagues and this malady, which has kept them from resembling pennant contenders in the past, now has placed even their first division berth in jeopardy.

The Cronin Clouters were stopped 5-1 by the Washington Senators at the capital last night and now have lost 12 of their last 17 encounters, all but three away from home.

Joe Gordon extended his current hitting streak to 13 games yesterday and won a 3-2 decision for the world champions over the Philadelphia Athletics by rapping a single with the bases loaded and the score tied in the ninth.

Virgil (Fire) Trucks, strike-out king of International League last year, pitched his first complete game for Detroit Tigers and held the Cleveland Indians to four hits for a 6-2 victory.

The St. Louis Browns rallied for four runs in the eighth inning to beat the Chicago White Sox 6-4 and gain their sixth victory in seven games.

The Brooklyn Dodgers set down the Boston Braves pitching seven-hit ball.

The St. Louis Cardinals took advantage of this outcome to strengthen their hold on second place in the National League with a 3-2 eleven-inning triumph over the faltering Pittsburgh Pirates, who now have lost 11 of 13 games.

Big Bill Lee, making a fine comeback this season, achieved his seventh victory by holding the Cincinnati Reds to six hits while the Chicago Cubs forged to a 2-1 triumph in 12 innings. Lee himself knocked in the winning run with a long fly.

RAY ROBINSON IS AWARDED VERDICT

New York, May 29.—(AP)—Ray Robinson still sports the longest winning streak in recent fight history today, but only because a referee saw one low punch where most ringersiders saw two—and booted.

There was no doubt about the booing by the 13,673 customers who sat in Madison Square Garden last night, both when the low punches were struck in the second round, and again after the fight, when Robinson was announced the winner of a 10-round decision over baby-faced Marty Servo from Uncle Sam's coast guard.

Two weeks ago, Allie Stolz tangled with Sammy Angott for Sammy's lightweight crown, and Sammy took the decision to a chorus of boos. Pro Golfers Plan to Campaign for Army, Navy Relief Funds

Atlantic City, May 29.—(AP)—Figuring that tournament golf will be ended for the duration within six weeks, the professionals are getting ready to pitch in and carry on an organized country-wide campaign to raise funds for the Army and Navy Relief societies and the Red Cross.

Between rounds of their annual P.G.A. championship at the Seaview club here, they got together last night and agreed to shoot the works. President Ed Dudley announced that the association would contribute the services of its tournament manager, Fred Corcoran, to line up benefit matches and the players agreed to devote a good part of their time to the program.

Of the eight stars competing in quarter-final matches today, six agreed to place themselves at Corcoran's disposal. The other two, Corporal Jim Turnesa and Sammy Snead, already have signed with Uncle Sam's armed forces.

NYU FAVORED IN IC4A TRACK MEET

New York, May 29.—(AP)—It was New York University and Leslie MacMittell against Penn State and Barney Ewell today as the 66th annual Intercollegiate A. A. A. track and field championships opened their two-day stand at Triborough Stadium.

N. Y. U., defending the outdoor crown it won for the first time last year, was expected to get its stiffest competition from Penn State, which won the IC4A indoor championship for the first time last March, but each pinned its title hopes on its sparkling individual stars.

MacMittell and Ewell will be ending their varsity careers along with Big Al Blozis, Georgetown's shot put and discus champ. For three years this trio has been as dependable as the tide. Among them they have won a total of 26 IC4A titles.

BASEBALL VOTED MAJOR ATHLETIC

SNELL'S MARGIN WAS 9,308 VOTES

Portland, May 29.—(AP)—Secretary of State Earl Snell defeated Governor Sprague by 9,308 votes in Multnomah county in the recent republican primary, the official count showed today. Snell's total was 28,987, Sprague 19,679.

Senator McNary polled 39,455 votes to 9,234 for Arthur M. Geary. Lew Wallace, successful democrat gubernatorial aspirant, polled 15,788 to 15,001 for Howard Latourette. Walter W. Whitbeck, winner of the democratic senatorial nomination, polled 20,281 votes against 10,635 for his rival, Dr. MacBeth A. Milne, Portland.
