

EARLY START ON PLANS FOR PEACE URGED BY DOVER

Memorial Day Address
Stresses Need Now—Exercises In Park.

"Only if we start thinking and talking and planning now can we prepare for a form of world government that will give the people of the world these three things that are essential to any decent civilization; one, real and lasting peace; two, freedom and equal opportunity for individual citizens, and three, business and industrial prosperity that will mean jobs for individual citizens, that will give them a chance to work for their own and their families' security."

This was the keynote of a Memorial day message delivered at city park yesterday by Floyd K. Dover of Grants Pass, past state commander of the Disabled American Veterans of the World war, following a patriotic parade in which social, fraternal, civic and patriotic organizations participated.

Mr. Dover, declaring that "we are here mostly in memory of the men who at this very moment are dying for their country," urged that we immediately make plans for writing the peace treaty and to provide the world with some form of regular, organized government.

Unless we do this now, if we wait to do our thinking until after the war is over, the likely consequences, he said, would probably be "a treaty like most of the treaties of the past, which will sow the seeds of another war; a form of government based on bloody revolution and totalitarianism of one kind or another, or a form of semi-government that will have very little chance of preventing another war."

Mr. Dover advised that this form of government so much needed in the post-war world is embodied in the constitution of the United States of America, a form of government that guaranteed for its people the three things "essential to any decent civilization."

"Unfortunately for us," he said, "the people of the world didn't adopt that form of government and put it into effect in time to prevent this war. But we can, if we begin laying our plans now, adopt it and put it into effect in time to prevent another war after this one."

Wars are caused, Mr. Dover stated, because for thousands of years the world has tried to manage relations between its individual nations by a system which not even the most backward nation would dream of trying to use to manage relations between its individual citizens.

"A system," he declared, "in which each individual nation says in effect, 'I will not abide by any rules or laws unless I choose to. I will do as I please, when I please, no matter how much harm it may do to anyone else.'"

The speaker said: "We know that human beings can't live with each other, trade with each other and get along successfully with each other without some form of regular, organized government, yet we expect the nations of the world, which are made up of human beings, to live with each other, and trade with each other without any form of government whatsoever."

Mr. Dover said that at times, in desperation, we have worked out peace plans and put them into operation, such as the League of Nations but that all of these plans have been successful only within limits. "Beyond these limits they have failed the moment they were faced with the main problem for which they were created—to prevent war," he declared.

They failed, he asserted, "because not one of them was backed by a form of government, the thing that we all know is absolutely necessary if human beings or groups of human beings are to get along with each other successfully."

Prior to Mr. Dover's address, Miss Ora Cox read Gen. John A. Logan's first Memorial day order, given on May 30, 1868. Lincoln's Gettysburg address was delivered by Davis Dawson, member of the Medford senior high school debating team, and representatives of veteran and patriotic organizations decorated vacant chairs in honor of their departed comrades. The singing of "America" and the benediction by the Rev. Carl W. Brockhaus completed the program.

Included in the parade were the Medford senior high school band, the Oregon State Guard in full uniform, Daughters of the Union Veterans of the Civil war, United Spanish War Veterans and auxiliary, the senior high school girls' drum corps, the American Legion, Gold Star Mothers, Navy Mothers and the junior high school girls' drum corps.

'EAT TURKEY OR EAT CROW' BOND SLOGAN FOR JUNE

"Eat turkey or crow." That will be the war cry in Jackson county during the month of June.

Because Jackson county war bond committee members have challenged the Multnomah county war bond committee to a campaign which will end with the Multnomah county committee "eating crow," W. A. Gates, Jackson county war bond sales chairman announced yesterday.

Telegrams received in this city late Friday from Multnomah county indicated their willingness to participate in a contest which runs during the month of June. The county whose total sales show an increase over May in sale of war bonds will "eat turkey" and the losing county committee members will "eat crow."

Ray Conway of Portland, who is state chairman of war bond sales, recently "ate crow" which the Portland shipyard workers showed an increase in their war bond purchases after Conway sponsored a war bond sales contest. And newspaper reports and pictures give actual proof that Conway ate the bird.

Gates said yesterday that Jackson county patriotism in backing U. S. democracy will eventually reach an all-time high during the month of June. He stated he was assured that the county's patriotic response to this new drive would be indicative to win the campaign.

Following are the telegrams which were received by Multnomah and Jackson county war bond committees in witness of the June war bond campaign which gets underway tomorrow.

Ray Conway of Portland received the first telegram which read: "Jackson county challenges Multnomah county for percentage increase June over May—a 25-pound turkey to be furnished by loser. You ate crow, now chance to eat turkey or another crow." Signed W. A. Gates.

In response came the following wire to Mr. Gates: "Accept challenge on basis percentage of increase June sales over May sales. This a cinch for Multnomah county. Insist on Douglas county for slow pickled clean, prepared for slow roasting and stuffed with Jackson county committee." Larry Hilaire, chairman Multnomah county war savings committee.

To Larry Hilaire: "Multnomah county's acceptance of our challenge duly acknowledged and specifications for turkey enthusiastically approved. Our deepest appreciation for mention of our oversight specifying southern Oregon bird as resemblance between Multnomah turkey and crow you consumed recently might be more than purely coincidental. Jackson county committee will be stuffed with turkey, not in one. You will get the bird but with reverse English." W. A. Gates.

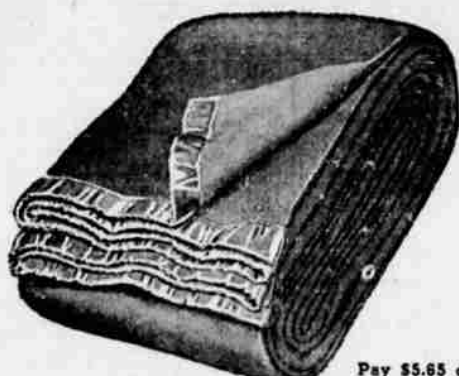

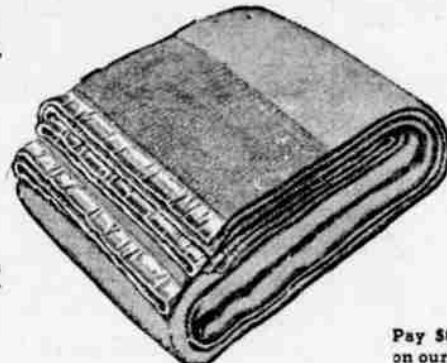
