

Trojan Trackmen Capture Coast Title; State Sixth, Oregon Last

SOUTHERN TEAMS DOMINATE MEET; NO RECORDS SET

Hal Davis In Good Form—
Two-Mile Race Thriller—
Wind Slows Athletes.

Seattle, May 30.—(AP)—Never finishing worse than third in the 12 events in which they scored, the University of Southern California Trojans won their seventh consecutive Pacific Coast conference track and field meet here today with 79 points.

The Trojans won five firsts, shared another, and finished two-three in five other events. They failed to place in the javelin and discus, and didn't enter their ace two-miler, Leroy Weed, because "we didn't need the points, and Weed's tired. He had already won the mile."

The state of California monopolized the first three places. After the Trojans came California, with 43½ points and Stanford with 23½. Then followed Washington, northern division champion, 21 1/3; Idaho, 14½; Oregon State, 10 1/3; Washington State and Montana, 9 apiece; U. C. L. A., 7½, and Oregon, 5 1/3.

Only one Coast conference record was equalled, and none was broken.

Hal Davis, currently the "fastest human" from the University of California, dominated both dashes and tied the conference mark for the 100-yard dash by hustling the distance in 9.6 to share the record set by Clyde Jeffrey of Stanford here in 1939. A headwind may have slowed him up from his 9.4 pace in the Fresno relays May 16.

Davis also capped the 220, coming in six yards ahead of Cliff Bourland of U. S. C. in 21.6, or six-tenths of a second off the record.

Thriller of the meet was the two-mile. It was a battle between Ralph Dewey, husky Californian, and gaunt Vic Dyrnall of Idaho. Dewey finally won at the tape by the thickness of his chest as they both gasped across. The time was 9:20.3, or more than seven seconds off the record. Dyrnall led after seven laps by only two paces. Dewey caught him at the end of the final turn and they both wobbled rubber-legged neck-and-neck to the finish.

Southern California's Cliff Bourland won the 440 and ran the winning leg of the mile relay.

Then, in the relay, Bourland overcame long in the final stretch with a great show of drive to finish ahead by 10 yards.

Distances in the field events were far short of the records, and a headwind bothered the runners although the track was considered fast.

WHIRLAWAY LOSES; HIGHEST BETTING IN TURF HISTORY

New York, May 30.—(AP)—In the gaudiest betting day in American racing history, Lou Tufano's Market Wise made his jinx on Whirlaway stick today.

Before the greatest crowd ever to see a race in New York, and on a card that saw \$2,176,071 poured into the mutual machines to shatter all marks in the books, the "Cinderella" of the race tracks won the 56th running of the ancient suburban handicap at Belmont Park by a startling three lengths over Whirlly.

The wagering on the eight-race card wiped out the listed United States high of \$2,096,613 tossed into the hopper on Kentucky Derby day in 1926. Of the total, \$385,042 was bet on the suburban alone, a one-race high for New York. And the \$149,988 Whirlly carried on his back for win, place and show was more than any one horse has ever had on him in these parts.

SAVOLDI - SOCKEYE ARMORY GO MAY BE BATTLE OF FEET

It could be a "battle of drop-kicks," this main event grapple embroglio in the armory Monday night between Sockeye Jack Savoldi and Jumpin' Joe McDonald, the master of them all at the fine art of knocking a guys head off with your feet.

HARD ARMY DRILL AHEAD FOR LOUIS; CALL OFF BOUTS

Washington, May 30.—(AP)—The army has about decided it's time Private Joe Louis Barrow learned to fight more effectively with rifle and bayonet as well as with his renowned fists.

The heavyweight champion probably soon will be ordered transferred to a replacement training center or to some other post to complete his basic military training, it was learned authoritatively.

And at least until this military training is completed, there would be no ring appearances for any purposes but the army.

The effect of the decision is to rule out the plea by Promoter Mike Jacobs that the brown bomber be permitted to make a commercial appearance to raise money to meet a \$117,000 income tax payment due June 15.

In the approximately four months Louis has been officially enrolled as Private Barrow, he has fallen far behind the military progress made by others who were inducted about the same time. They were given a routine but stiff course of basic training at replacement centers lasting 13 weeks.
