BRAZIL CORRALLS 400 NAZI SPIES

Rio de Janeiro, May 30—(P)—More than 400 suspected axis spies have been arrested in Brazil since March 18 but the undercover agents' network is not yet wiped out, Capt. Felisberto Batista Teixeira, chief of the anti-espionage bureau, said today.

"The magnificent results of our efforts thus far have not been sufficient to assure that the German military espionage network is completely destroyed in Brazil or even in the federal district," Capt. Teixeira told a press conference.

SINK ENEMY SUB OFF MARTINIQUE

San Juan, Puerto Rico, May 30—(P)—The tenth naval district announced today the sinking of an enemy submarine off the French island of Martinique on Wednesday by a navy pilot who said he dropped four bombs within four minutes on the undersea boat from an altitude of only 50 to 100 feet.

The announcement confirmed previous reports that a submarine had been sunk, but did not make it clear whether it was one of those engaged in attacks on the United States Destroyer Blakeley, which was torpedoed off Martinique and attacked again en route to the United States naval base at St. Lucia.

MICHIGAN STORM LEAVES SIX DEAD

Detroit, May 30—(P)—A toll of six persons dead and scores injured were reported today after a violent storm which swept over lower Michigan last night.

The storm, which lasted less than half an hour, was particularly severe in Oakland county in southeastern Michigan, and caused extensive property damage and disruption of communications.

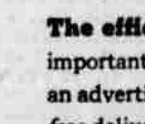
