Retires From Ministry

Jacksonville, May 30.—(Spl.)—Climaxing more than 50 years in the ministry, the Rev. E. N. Mallory of Jacksonville plans to retire from active service about the first of June. During this time the Mallorys have served churches in five states and the pastor is closing his career in one of the oldest churches in Oregon.

Born at Cedar Falls, Ia., Nov. 25, 1861, the Rev. Mallory was converted at Correctionville, Ia., in 1889 and upon entering the ministry was licensed to preach at Fort Dodge, Ia., in 1891. He was married to Miss Bessie Covill of Lamolite, Ill., in 1894, uniting with the Colorado conference of the Methodist church and Rev. Mallory was ordained by Bishop C. C. McCabe at Fort Collins, Colo., in 1895. He served in Colorado for 25 years, serving various churches in Colorado and New Mexico, also in Florida and being active in evangelistic work. Later they moved to California for 10 years where the Rev. Mallory preached in Glendale, Balboa and Indio.

Deciding to retire from active service they took a small ranch near Phoenix but shortly were asked to serve the Phoenix Presbyterian church for 18 months and later retired a second time. Again the Rev. Mallory was called to active service and supplied the pulpit of the Jacksonville Presbyterian church where he has served for the past five years.

The Rev. Lawrence Mitchellmore, of Merrill, Ore., will arrive about June 1 to take over the pulpits of the Jacksonville and Phoenix churches.

Besides serving the church the Rev. Mallory has been active in school and civic affairs. He was instrumental in redecorating and landscaping the church and also secured two memorial markers in tribute to Jacksonville pioneer ministers. He recently designed, made and presented Jacksonville school with a school flag.

It is with regret that Jacksonville residents see Rev. and Mrs. Mallory leave. They have been a sterling influence on all with whom they have come in contact. This earnest cooperation in civic and school matters will be long remembered and has won for them a place in the hearts of everyone.

For the present the Mallorys plan to reside at the home of their daughter in Medford.
