WILLAMETTE HEAD RESIGNS; PROTEST STAND ON DRAFT

Salem, May 30—(P)—President Carl Sumner Knopf of Willamette University resigned after a special committee of the school's board of trustees criticized his conduct in registering for the draft.

Dr. Knopf wrote the words "conscientious objector" on his selective service card last month despite protest of draft board officials over his right to do so. The matter became public when the Salem American Legion posted accused Knopf of creating a disturbance and registering only after police action was threatened.

The trustees' committee said the accusations were false and that legion officials agreed "their charges were inaccurate in important particulars." The committee also upheld Knopf's legal right to note his objection to arms-bearing on the draft card.

But the committee's report said, Dr. Knopf "by his conduct in this matter exposed himself, the University and all of its constituency to a grievous misunderstanding."

It continued, "We believe that he owed a duty to the University to refrain from expression of views or any action which could be construed as committing the university to any position on such a vital question without consultation with and express authority of the University's governing board."

LIFT LUMBER BAN TO AID HOUSING

Washington, May 30—(P)—Restrictions on lumber will be lifted to enable construction of emergency housing in Portland to go ahead, Senator McNary said today.

He informed Lester W. Humphreys, counsel for the Portland housing authority, that the war production board has promised removal of the lumber ban. WPA also had asked the munitions board to release nails, plumbing supplies and other essential building materials to Portland builders, the Senator said.

Humphreys told McNary that work on 3,500 units for war workers was being held up because of inability to obtain lumber and other materials.

MODEL CONVICTED, FACES LIFE TERM FOR \$13 MURDER

New York, May 30—(P)—Madeline Webb, who will be 29 in three days, will spend this birthday and probably all the rest of her birthdays in jail, as the penalty for taking part in a murder that netted \$13.

A jury convicted her last night of first degree murder in the March 4 robbery-slitting of Mrs. Susan Flare Reich, but recommended mercy—13 months imprisonment.

All her moans—"please, judge, I didn't do it, please"—could not shake the verdict.

Her lover, Eli Shonbrun, pleaded for her, too. "She's as innocent as my mother, judge," he sobbed, even as the jury announced a sterner verdict for him.

Shonbrun and a third defendant, John D. Cullen, were found guilty of first degree murder without a mercy recommendation, automatically dooming them to death in the electric chair.

The three were convicted of killing Mrs. Reich in the course of robbing her of a \$1,500 diamond ring. Testimony showed they never were able to sell the diamond, and that the sale of the ring's mounting netted only \$13.

FRENCH MEAT RATION SIX OUNCES PER WEEK

Vichy, France, May 30—(P)—The June meat ration in unoccupied France was fixed officially today at 180 grams—or less than six ounces—per person a week.

The ration may be consumed at any of four specified meals during the week—including two on Sunday.

BRIDE A SUICIDE

Waukegan, Ill., May 29—(P)—The body of a pretty 25-year-old bride-to-be who drove more than 2,000 miles in a borrowed car since her disappearance three weeks ago, was found in the car on a lonely road near here today. A coroner's jury decided the death was suicide.
