

GIRL'S DAY CAMP OPENING TUESDAY FOR MONTH'S RUN

Campers Should Register at
500 East Main Street or
at Grounds on Bear Creek

The Fourth Annual Girls' Camp will open tomorrow and continue each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday during the month of June under the sponsorship of the Medford Girl Scout council. The camp is located south of Medford on the Barnett road along Bear Creek behind the Fairgrounds. Campers should register at 500 East Main street but registrations will be taken each day at the campsite.

Camping hours are from 10:30 a. m. until 3:30 p. m. and girls are responsible for their own transportation. The camp is open to all girls in the community between the ages of seven and 18, whether she is a Girl Scout or not. Each camper brings her own lunch for noon and after the first day of camp, units may plan to cook their meals. A nickel fee is charged a day to pay for craft materials.

Use Unit System
The Day Camp is operated on a unit system with girls of like ages carrying on their independent programs through the entire day with the exception of morning and evening ceremonies. Activities include arts and crafts, dramatics, singing, folk games, active games, out-door cookery, nature, photography, archery, and others. Each group of girls plan their own activities under the supervision of volunteer adult counselors.

The day camp staff is composed of Girl Scout leaders, council and committee members and volunteer workers. Women desiring to give this civilian defense service to young girls in the community are asked to participate. Mrs. Paul Janney is day camp chairman and will be at the campsite each day to greet newcomers and to assist in securing counselors. She has worked with the city superintendent in arranging the campsite, putting up the shelter and preparing the tables and grounds.

It is hoped that newcomers from the trailer camps, outlying rural districts and neighboring towns will participate in the Day Camp program. In event of rain the first meeting to organize various units will be held Wednesday at 10:30 a. m. in the Lincoln school gymnasium.

BERRY HARVEST GETS UNDER WAY

Harvesting of the valley strawberry crop will get underway this week. Assistant County Assistant C. B. Cordy reported today. It is estimated about 50 per cent of the crop, in patches located in cold areas, was damaged. In the higher and protected areas there was no damage. The earlier varieties were picked a fortnight ago. Cordy said there would be no surplus of local strawberries.

The Trail and Prospect district strawberries will not be ready to pick for at least two weeks.

GUARD TRAINING SCHOOL OPENED IN FOREST CAMP

65 Forest Service Guards
Given Intensive Instruction
in Duties at Carberry

The Rogue River National Forest's annual guard training school opened today at Carberry camp, with 65 guards in attendance. Maurice L. Tedrow, fire assistant for the forest, is in charge. Forest officers and protective assistants are acting as instructors in the school which will close Thursday.

Because the war has brought greater needs for fire protection, training in this year's school will be more intense than ever before, it was announced. Immediately following the school a one-day session will be held at each of the district headquarters on the forest so that district rangers may give special instructions to their respective groups of guards.

Ten new guard positions have been authorized for various points in the forest and three suppression crews of 10 men each will be organized during June, each crew to be stationed in areas of high fire hazard and equipped to take immediate suppression action. Enrollees at CCC Camp South Fork will also be given special training for fire work.

In recognition of the serious problems connected with fire control this year, Harry P. Gaylor, assistant forest supervisor at Grand Mesa National Park, Colorado, has been detailed to assist in fire protection in the Rogue River National Forest. Gaylor will contact guards at their stations during the summer months for follow-up training, will inspect industrial operations for compliance with fire laws, and assist in the establishment of new lookout and fire guard stations. He is one of several men being sent to the western forests from other regions to assist in this work.

SHERIFF SWAMPED BY JOB SEEKERS

Close to 500 residents of Jackson county and transients answered the sheriff's office call last Friday, for 20 men to do guard duty, presumably in connection with the guarding of equipment, Deputy Sheriff William Grenbner reported today.

Applications started Friday afternoon late, and were still coming in this morning. Up to noon today 40 applications had been received. Some of the applications were filed by telephone at 3 o'clock in the morning. The sheriff's office said some applications were received from workers now employed at the cantonment.

The rush of applications came from all sections of the county, from the summit of the Siskiyou to Union Creek, and a few from Grants Pass and Josephine county.

JAIL DOORS CLANK ON 133 IN MONTH

The city jail housed 133 law violators during the month of May as compared to 16 for May, 1941. The May figure was 22 over the total for April when 111 were held in jail compared to 20 for April, 1941. May, 1942, is an eight and one-third per cent increase over May, 1941.

VOTERS LEAGUE SERVICE PLANS TOLD AT MEET

The new "war-time service" program of the League of Women Voters was outlined at a meeting of officers of the Jackson county branch Saturday afternoon. As explained by Mrs. Leonard Carpenter and Mrs. F. G. Hughes, delegates to the national and state convention of the league, the new program is being carried on as a means of disseminating information about current governmental activities to the general public.

National league leaders state that since ordinary governmental activities tend to be neglected in time of national stress, such as the present war, the new program was felt to be essential. Locally the program will be handled by a committee headed by Mrs. Justin Smith.

In addition to the convention reports, the new study programs of the state and national leagues were read and discussed and plans were made for re-organization of the board and summer activities of the league. Consideration is being given to replacing the former departmental study groups with the activities of the new war-time service program.

JAP MIDGET SUBS ATTEMPT ATTACK ON SYDNEY PORT

Harbor, ran into thundering shellfire and depth charges in the Australian harbors Sunday night and three of them probably were destroyed.

Old Steamer Lost
This may have been the entire force, which apparently stole its way to Sydney from a mothership lying off southeastern Australia. The Japanese succeeded in sinking an old steamer used as a ferry.

The allied air forces based on Australian soil started large fires and wrecked docks and air-dromes at enemy lodgements in Timor, northeastern New Guinea and the Solomon islands, General MacArthur's headquarters reported.

Just before dawn yesterday Japanese establishments at Lae, New Guinea, were bombed so suddenly that only one fighter got off to oppose the raiders. On Saturday night the allies struck at the Koepong airdrome on Dutch Timor and the harbor at Dili, capital of the Portuguese half of that Japanese-held island.

On Friday night the allies made a 2,000-mile roundtrip to Tulagi in the Solomon islands, setting at the Japanese seaplane base there fires which could be seen for 80 miles. Tanamoga and Gaavutu, also in the Solomons, were raided on the same night.

In China, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's fighters were engaged in a wide-flung diversionary action in Anhwei province, in an effort to offset a Japanese offensive which had overrun Kinhuwa, capital of neighboring Chekiang province, and nearby Lanchi.

Tide With Japs
The Chinese were able to recapture certain points behind the

Japanese Chekiang line, but the tide of battle was still generally with the enemy. In Anhwei, however, regulars and guerrillas struck the foe at several places extending from the neighborhood of Nanking to more than 175 miles inland and up the Yangtze river.

The Japanese reported an air raid on an airfield near Kunming, southwestern China, in which, they said, 10 planes were destroyed, including five of the P-40 type used by the American Flying Tigers.

The Japanese announced they had opened still another front against Chungking's forces with an offensive in Kwangtung province where the Japanese have a long-established base in Canton, on the south China coast.

Domei, Japanese news agency, said that "a steady, northward drive" was in progress against "tens of thousands" of Chinese troops some 50 miles northeast of Canton.

The Tule Lake center is permanent for the duration, housing also Japanese who have been at the Portland assembly center and those who registered last week at other western Oregon control centers. The buses in which the local group journeyed to Tule Lake were under military guard.
