

MASS ENLISTMENT TO AVENGE BLOW AT PEARL HARBOR

Navy To Hold Nation-Wide
Ceremony On June 7—
Enlistment Classes Listed.

The Navy Department today announced intention of holding a nation-wide ceremony where-in men from all over the country may enlist as "Avengers of Pearl Harbor." At 7:55 a. m. Honolulu time, last December 7, the first bombs were dropped on Pearl Harbor. On June 7, at exactly the corresponding hour and minute, or 11:55 a. m. Pacific war time, in every one of the 500 recruiting stations throughout the United States, the oath of enlistment will be administered to all Navy enlistees who desire to volunteer.

the place where this ceremony will take place in Medford will be announced later in the week.

The following description of the various classes of enlistments are set forth for the benefit of young men wishing to participate in this event.

Class V-1 is for men aged 17 to 20 who are attending or wish to attend college and receive draft deferment. Upon successful completion of four years college, if in all respects qual-

ified, these men will be sent to a naval reserve officers' training school after which they will receive commissions as ensigns to remain on active duty for the duration of the war. Class V-2 is for men who wish to attend any of the ground schools of aviation such as mechanics, metallurgy, radio and gunnery.

Class V-3 is for men who wish to attend the communication radio school or clerical school. Class V-5 is the aviation cadet branch. High school graduates aged 18 to 27 may enlist directly for pilot training, leading to a commission as ensign in the flying corps.

Class V-6 is the general service class from which men are selected for all other trade schools and vocational training. Class V-6 "R" is for men with a good background in high school mathematics and physics or radio theory and repair who wish to learn ultra-high frequency radio and television.

They are sent directly to radio school for eight months, also a mathematics refresher course at St. Mary's college in California.

Class V-7 is the officers training program. College graduates, married or single, aged 19 to 28 are sent to Notre Dame university for four months indoctrination training at the Naval Officers' training school and if qualified are commissioned as ensigns in the naval reserve to remain on active duty with the navy for duration of the war. All the above enlistments are for duration of the war.

JAP PROPAGANDA AIDES CONVICTED

Washington, June 2 (AP)—Frederick Vincent Williams and David Warren Ryder, San Francisco publicists, were convicted by a federal court jury today of a conspiracy to violate the foreign agents registration act.

The government contended that the two men acted as propaganda agents for the Japanese government, being paid in part for their work by the Japanese council general in San Francisco.

Originally six persons were indicted in the case but two Japanese left the country and the other two defendants pleaded guilty and nolo contendere (I do not contend).

Justice T. Alan Goldsborough said he would pass sentence Friday.

COUNTY GETS \$1,494 TO HELP STAGE FAIR

Salem, June 2 (AP)—The state department distributed \$48,047 today to the 36 counties to help finance their county fairs. The money is raised by a tax of 1-20 of a mill on taxable property.

The 1941 apportionment was \$44,839. The amounts received by counties included: Jackson, \$1494.

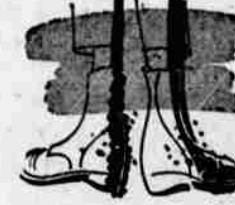
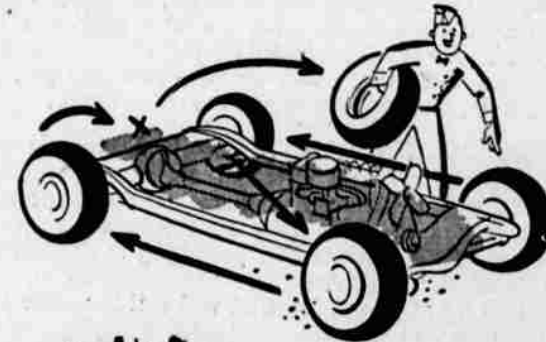
