

ONE YEAR COURSE IN AERONAUTICS IS TALKED HERE

Plans are underway in Medford to add a one-year course in aeronautics for seniors and possibly juniors at Medford high school beginning next fall, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent said today. The course will cover navigation, meteorology, civil air regulations and general pre-flight training with the exception of flight training.

Dr. Clark M. Fraser, representing the civil aeronautical association met in this city Saturday with schoolmen from southern Oregon and Klamath Falls. At that time the course was discussed, preparatory to getting it started in various high schools in Oregon.

Requirements for the course will be algebra and geometry and candidates must have taken or be taking physics. Mr. Hedrick said that there are 190 Medford students, now exclusive of seniors, who have a background of mathematics which makes them eligible to take the course. Colleges are offering summer courses for teachers who have a mathematics and science background which will enable them to teach the course.

All are asked to bring their own picnic lunch. The picnic will take place on the river or in the new modern barn. Coffee, milk and ice cream will be served free.

Those desiring transportation are requested to meet at the Jackson county courthouse not later than 10:30 a. m. as some transportation will be provided. Others going direct to the grounds are requested to go via the Dodge bridge to avoid the congested traffic through the cantonment.

WALKOUT HALTS WAR PRODUCTION

Tacoma, June 2.—(P)—More than 1,000 workers at the big St. Paul & Tacoma Lumber company plant here and at three of its logging camps walked out today on strike, closing the plant.

Picket lines were thrown around the factory here which was working on thousands of dollars worth of defense contracts.

The strike was called by the CIO International Woodworkers of America.

Freeman L. Cochran, secretary of the union local, said the walkout was called when long-standing negotiations broke down.

He said the union demanded a one-dollar a day wage increase and vacations with pay.

SPENDING FOR WAR REACHES NEW HIGH

Washington, June 2.—(P)—The treasury's cash outlays for war activities reached \$3,552,676,987 in May, a new high.

This represented a jump of more than \$300,000,000 from the April pace. Illustrating the steady step-up of war efforts, this May's war spending was more than four times the corresponding defense outlays of the similar month last year.

It brought war costs for the first 11 months of the fiscal year which ends June 30 to the unprecedented total of \$22,130,946,353. In the most expensive year of the last World War, the treasury never spent more than \$18,500,000,000 for all purposes in the entire year.

Principal expenditures in May were \$1,496,932,729 for the army, \$1,228,379,580 for the navy, and \$626,246,032 for lend-lease.

WILLKIE BACKING FAILS TO HELP

Des Moines, Ia., June 2.—(P)—Governor George A. Wilson captured the Iowa Republican nomination for senator today on the basis of unofficial incomplete returns in the state's largest primary in 20 years.

Returns from 2,025 of 2,463 precincts gave Wilson 102,115. State Secretary of Agriculture Mark G. Thornburg was in second place with 64,988.

Wendell L. Willkie declared here recently that Thornburg "would make a good senator." Senator Clyde L. Herring, Democratic incumbent who was renominated, polled 51,437 votes in 1,957 precincts. His isolationist foe, Ernest J. Seemann, was far behind with 14,655.

Furlough Granting for Selectees to Be Changed July 1

A representative of the local selective service boards announced today that the present policy of granting furloughs to inducted men after they have been received at the induction station will be discontinued July 1. After July 1st, there will be instituted a new procedure whereby every inducted man will be released from active service at the induction station for a period of approximately 14 days, unless he prefers to proceed directly to the reception center. Under the present plan which will be in operation until July 1, the selectee must secure a letter of recommendation from his selective service board if he desires a furlough after being inducted at the induction station.

The announcement today was made so that registrants may understand what they can expect after they have been called and sent to the induction station.
