

Padres Nip Beavers, 3-2 In 11 Innings; Take Over Second Place

PORTLAND RALLY IN NINTH KNOTS SCORE AT 2-ALL

May Have Been Last Night Game For San Diego—Seals, Angels Victorious.

(By Associated Press) San Diego, The Pacific Coast league team overlooked by most experts at the opening of the baseball season, bobbed up in second place, a full game ahead of Sacramento after defeating Portland, 3 to 2, in 11 innings last night.

The Solons helped the Padres into the runner-up spot behind Los Angeles by dropping a game to Seattle in the ninth inning when Rainier batsmen blasted Blix Donnelly for four hits and five runs to break a tie and won, 6 to 1.

At San Diego, Padre Manager Cedric Durst said his club is prepared to shift from night to a twilight or day schedule if civilian defense officials rule that Lane field lights violate coastal dim-out orders.

Portland came from behind to score two runs in the ninth and force last night's game into extra innings in what may have been the last night game at the Padre home park which is located near the waters of San Diego bay.

Dasso Routed Beaver stickmen drove Frankie Dasso from the mound in the crucial ninth-inning rally after he had yielded four consecutive hits to bring his game total to nine safeties. Norman Brown relieved and held the Beavers.

BONHAM CAPTURES EIGHTH STRAIGHT FOR NEW YORKERS

Big Righthander Stops Nats, 4-1 With Eight Hits—Phils Tip Reds Again.

(By Judson Bailey) (Associated Press Sports Writer) Ernie Bonham, the undefeated righthanded pitching star of the New York Yankees, is getting too good for his own good.

Jumbo won his eighth straight game yesterday, 4-1 at the expense of the Chicago White Sox. He kept eight hits scattered, walked only two, and would have had a shutout except for a homer by Joe Kuhel in the seventh.

This pitching almost certainly would have satisfied the supporters of any other hurler in the majors, but the onlookers at Yankee stadium were quick to size it up as one of Bonham's poorest performances of the season.

In the first place it wasn't a shutout. The big fellow had administered four of these in his first seven starts and by the time he had laid six goose-eggs end to end yesterday some of the boys figured he should have had another.

Besides it was the first time this year he had allowed more than seven hits. And those two bases on balls, tsk, tsk. He had yielded only five passes in seven games previously, and two in one game surely was slipping.

Tigers Beaten The Philadelphia Athletics brought the Detroit Tigers to a sudden stop with a 5-1 decision on Jack Knott's six-hit hurling.

The St. Louis Browns routed Sid Hudson with an eight-run assault in the second inning and went on to whip Washington, 9-3, dropping the Senators into the American league cellar.

In the National league the Pittsburgh Pirates received a reprieve from the weather man.

Meanwhile the Boston Braves moved a game closer to the second-place Cardinals by capturing a 4-3 twilight struggle at St. Louis.

Frank (Rube) Melton pitched and batted the Phils to a 2-1 10-inning triumph over the Cincinnati Reds in a night game. He spaced six hits and doubled home the winning run. Big Paul Derringer pitched five-hit ball, but his teammates committed four errors.

Russell Homers Glen Russell, whose job as Chicago Cubs' first baseman has been threatened by the purchase of Jimmy Foxx, belted a home run with the bases full in the first inning to lead Chicago to a 6 to 2 triumph over the New York Giants.

WHAT TO DO IN AN AIR RAID

1.—In any air raid or blackout, take cover immediately.
(A) If you are away from home, get off the street. You are 10 times safer in a building than standing or walking on the street. If you are in a car, pull to the side of the road immediately. Do not double park. Keep clear of fire plugs. Get out of the car, bus, or street car and take shelter.

(B) If you are at home, take immediate blackout precautions. Extinguish all lights. Have your fire protection equipment ready. Go to your blackout room; it should be the safest room in your home. Stay away from windows. Bomb explosions shatter glass for considerable distances.

2.—Don't use the telephone. Remember those persons who have been trained to protect you—the air raid wardens, fire watchers, auxiliary firemen, auxiliary police and many others, must be able to get really important messages through. Your personal calls have got to wait until after the all-clear signal.

3.—If you are caught in the open lie down on your stomach. You are twice as safe lying down as standing up.

4.—If incendiary bombs fall, play a coarse spray of water on them. Put out the fires started by the incendiaries first, then devote your attention to the bomb. The coarse spray of water will make the bomb explode. If you have no way of treating the bombs with water, cover it with dry sand. Then with a blunt nosed shovel scoop the bomb onto a pile of sand, dump the sand and bomb into a pail and take it outside.

5.—Remember, obey your air raid warden and other members of the United States Citizens Defense corps, they are trying to help you.

6.—Above all—keep cool—stay home—put out lights—take shelter—lie down—stay away from windows. You can help.

WHAT TO DO IN A GAS ATTACK

1.—Serious injury may result from exposure to liquid gas which may fall from airplanes. It is, therefore, imperative to remain indoors and keep the windows closed.

2.—War gases are heavier than air. If you are inside a building remain there, and, if possible, go upstairs. Do not complicate the military effort by leaving your house unless circumstances make it absolutely necessary. If you are outside and not able to immediately go indoors walk—do not run—get out of the gas area. Avoid puddles of liquid gas, basements, valleys and other low places.

3.—If the windows of your room are broken, go to another room, or get out of the building.

4.—If you have been exposed to a war gas:
A. Breathe through cloths wet with baking soda solution.
B. If you can go inside a building, do so, but first remove your outer clothing and leave it outside.

C. Wash your hands and then your face with laundry soap and water.

D. Wash your eyes at once with a large amount of a solution of baking soda; one teaspoonful of baking soda in a glass of water.

E. Take a bath using plenty of laundry soap.

F. Wash your eyes again with baking soda solution.

5.—If splashes of liquid gas have gotten on you:
A. Using small pieces of cloth, cleansing tissue or toilet paper, blot up as much of the liquid as you can, being careful not to spread it.

B. Dab the contaminated area with cloths wet with chlorine, purex, sani-clor, etc.

C. Steps B, C, D, E, and F in above.

6.—Do not get excited. Lie down and cover yourself with a blanket. Your air raid warden will summon medical aid. There is no immediate serious danger from exposure to any known war gas if you follow these simple rules. Clip them out and memorize them.

OLD BERRY HALLOCKS TABOO AFTER JULY 1

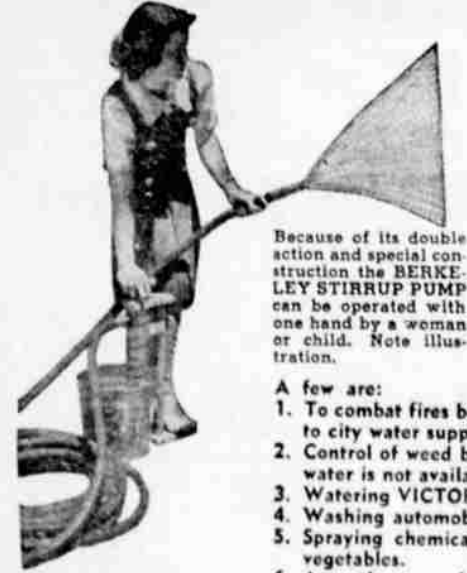

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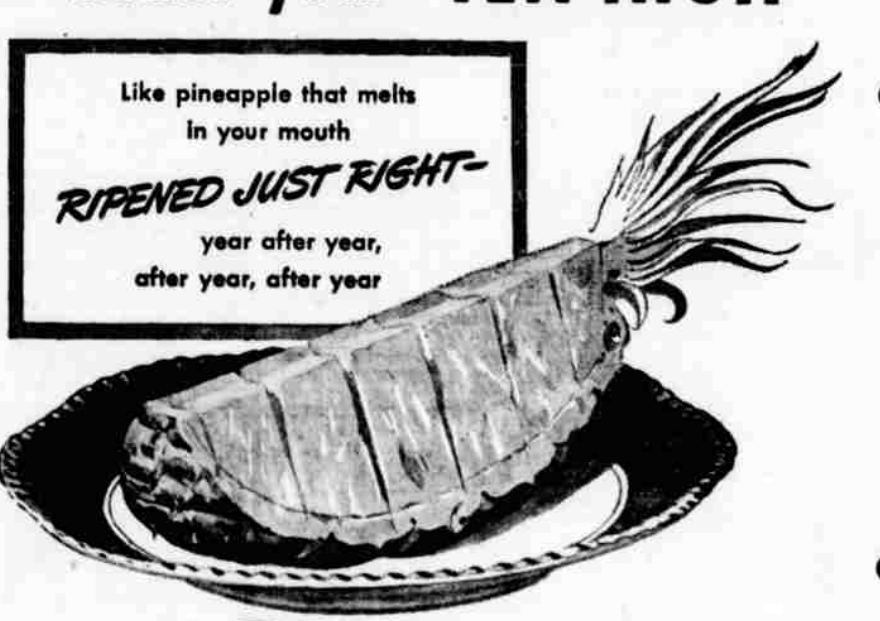
