JEHOVAH GETS FOUR-YEAR TERM

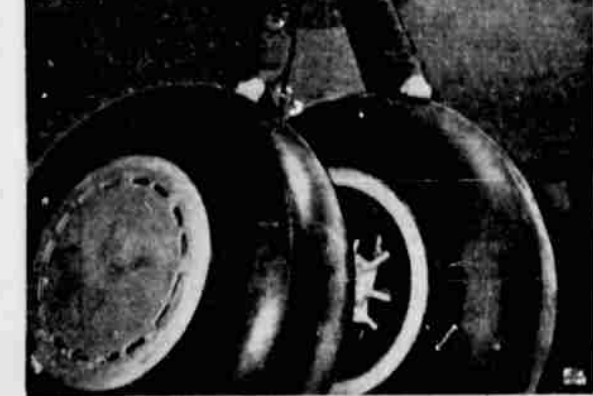
Portland, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Ralph E. Rogers, 23, was sentenced today by Federal Judge James A. Fee to four years in

federal prison for failure to report to Eugene for entrainment to a conscientious objector's camp.

Rogers, convicted in federal court yesterday, had pleaded exemption on the grounds that he was a minister in the Jehovah's witness sect.

The government offered testimony that Rogers' name was not on a list of ministers given the Lane county draft board by the sect.
