

MASS ENLISTMENT SLATED FOR 12:30 SUNDAY AT C OF C

25-Minute Program to Be
Conducted By Frank De-
Sousa—to Give Oath.

The navy enlistment program Sunday at the Victory Center near the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, in honor of youths who have pledged their services to the navy as "Avengers of Pearl Harbor," will start at 12:30 sharp instead of 11:55 as previously scheduled, it was announced today by Jack Carpenter, CEM, local navy recruiter.

The ceremony, to last 25 minutes, will include the announcement of the purpose of the gathering by Frank DeSousa, master of ceremonies; the roll call, with enlistees forming a "V" in the center of the platform as their names are called; introduction of a commissioned navy officer who will administer the oath to enlistees; the distribution of service window cards to parents of enlistees by J. C. Buckmaster, commander of Crater Lake Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the benediction, Adjutant Charles K. Cox of the Salvation Army.

The Medford senior high school band will provide the music, playing "Anchors Aweigh" while the enlistment men leave the platform to conclude the program.

NO DECISION ON GAS RATIONING

Washington, June 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and 11 government officials who are searching for a solution to the rubber and gasoline problems conferred at the White House today, but apparently reached no definite conclusions.

Archibald Macleish, director of the office of facts and figures, asserted a statement would be issued "in the nearish future." He interpreted that to mean a "matter of days," and said the state-

ment would come from the White House. In the meantime nearly 100 congressmen met and adopted a resolution proposing a congressional investigation of the gasoline-rubber situation, opposing nationwide rationing until "facts" are given congress to justify it, and attacking "bureaucratic methods" and dictatorial policies.

Pledges for bonds will be taken and a booth will be located at Victory Center for sale of stamps. Bonds and stamps also will be sold from 5:30 until 8 p. m. Saturday at both banks.

Beginning Saturday war stamp booths will be located daily in all the theatres from 7 until 9 p. m., handled by volunteer workers. Senior high school and college girls who will volunteer their services for these theatre booths are asked to telephone Mrs. Hornecker, 3352 or register at the Chamber of Commerce, Saturday at 1:30 p. m.

Volunteer workers who already have signed for sale of stamps and bonds in booths will be called by telephone to report for work Saturday at 1:30 p. m. at the Chamber of Commerce. Assignments will be given at that time and stamps distributed for the booths. Later an honor roll of volunteer workers will be announced.

OMAHA, June 5.—(AP)—The Union Pacific's 361 Mikado type freight locomotives have been re-christened "MacArthur's," President William Jeffers said today.

MINE OPERATOR OF GRANTS PASS CITED IN FRAUD

Portland, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Deputy U. S. Attorney Mason Dillard disclosed today the arrest in Yreka, Calif., of Phillip Suetter, head of a Grants Pass, Ore., mining venture, on charges of mail fraud and violation of the securities exchange act.

A secret indictment returned here charged Suetter, operator

of the Suetter's placer mines near Grants Pass, with false representation by mail in selling about \$300,000 worth of units in the mines.

Investors in Suetter ventures included the Most Rev. Francis J. Beckman, Catholic archbishop of Dubuque, Ia., \$250,000; The Most Rev. Paul P. Rhode, Catholic bishop of Green Bay, Wis., about \$30,000; The Rev. Stephen A. Bubacz, Chicago Catholic Priest; William E. Phillips and Marion Lester Laird, Chicago; A. C. Kunel, Oak Park, Ill.; Leo Gartland, Marian, Ind.

Suetter is charged with making false representations about his experience and success in mining, claiming that \$300,000 would produce three million in

three years, that his mines would pay 20 per cent on a hundred million dollar investment and that he had invested \$50,000 of his own money.

Dillard said that in 1939 the Most Rev. Beckman sued Suetter at Grants Pass for an accounting, but before the proceedings ended had invested \$20,000 more in the mines.

Dillard said Suetter was unable to make \$10,000 bail at Yreka and would be taken to Sacramento where removal proceedings will be started.
